WAR IN BALKANS WILL BE HALTED SOON, IS BELIEF

League of Nations Sets in Motion Machinery to Stop Hostilities

SITUATION IS GRAVE

Greeks to Halt Advances and Bulgarians Evacuating Positions

PARIS, Oct. 23.—(P)—The machinery of the league of nations was set in motion today in an effort to prevent another Balkan war.

M. Briand, as the presiding officer, has summoned the league council to meet here next Monday and investigate the cause of dispute which suddenly flared up between Greece and Bulgaria early this week.

The fighting started on Monday in the frontier region of Demirhisar but the mass of official and semi-official claims and counter claims which have emanated since from Sofia and Athens have failed to establish which side was responsible.

Face Each Other

The fact remains that hostile forces are facing each other in the valley of the Struma river which flows southward across the international boundary and into the Aegean sea, that villages and towns have been bombarded, and that blood has been spilled.

Advisers from trustworthy sources indicate that the town of Petrich, in Bulgarian territory, has been occupied and that a number of other towns in the Struma valley have been at least menaced by Greek troops.

Greek Invasion

A Greek official communique admits the entry of Greek troops into Bulgarian territory, but says the move was of "strategic necessity" to prevent further incursions of Bulgarians on Greek soil.

From Sofia comes the word that the Greeks are advancing on a 15 kilometer front on both banks of the Struma and that in addition to the use of artillery, airplanes have bombed bridges, tracks, roads and stations.

Advisers reaching Vienna declare Petrich, a Bulgarian village, crowded with Macedonian refugees, has been finally abandoned in flames, and that other towns, including Maraseostinovo and Marinople are under bombardment.

Grave Concern

The capitals of the neighboring countries display gravest concern over the outcome. A cabinet meeting was called in Belgrade, the Jugo-Slavian capital, and at its conclusion the situation was described as most delicate and calculated to cause "a terrible conflagration" if the Greeks advance continued.

An Athens dispatch this morning said the Greek government had ordered its forces to halt their advance and to make no further move against the Bulgarians unless there was a fresh attempt to attack them. The Bulgarians were said to have evacuated the positions they held on Greek territory.
