

**SCHOOL CENSUS IS BEING TAKEN**

First Report Will Be Made of Month; Large Increase Is Predicted

"And how many children have you, madam?"  
"And what might be their ages, ma'am?"  
"An' would you tell me how long you have lived in this community?"

The good housewife finally interrupts: "Well, what business is it of yours how many children I have or how old they are?" This is but a sample of hundreds of conversations that will take place in Klamath during the next two weeks. The reason is that the annual school census, in which every home in Klamath is visited, is now being taken. In sparsely populated districts, the job of ascertaining the number of children in the community be-

tween the ages of four and 21 years, has been turned over to the country school teacher. In more thickly populated communities, such as Merrill, Malin and Chiloquin, the job is being handled by hired men and women. From all indications, the figures will indicate a startling population increase in most sections of the county. At the present rate of return of reports to the county school clerk, it is believed that the census will be complete around the first of the month.

**County Assessors Will Meet Shortly**

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 23.—The annual state meeting of the county assessors of Oregon will begin in Salem Monday, November 2. Earl Fisher, state tax commissioner, announced yesterday. A considerable part of the program will be given over to a discussion of county ratios. Governor Pierce will address the assessors. Officers will be elected and the convention will conclude with a budget.

**Tobacco Magnate's Widow Ill; Is Not in Need of Funds**

NEW YORK, Oct. 23.—(AP)—Mrs. Lillian N. Duke, divorced wife of the late James B. Duke, tobacco magnate, is ill at her home here, it was learned today. Published reports that Mrs. Duke had died last night, and that she was penniless, were denied.

A man who had just come out of Mrs. Duke's apartment told reporters that two physicians were in attendance and that she was not in need of funds.

NEW YORK, Oct. 23.—(AP)—A bequest of \$10,000,000 to be administered by the Duke endowment was made in the will of the late James B. Duke, tobacco magnate, in his will filed for probate today at Somerville, N. J.

The will directed that \$4,000,000 of the \$10,000,000 bequest should go for the construction and equipment of a medical school, hospital and courses' home at Duke University, at Durham, N. C. The will does not reveal the total value of the Duke estate, which has been variously estimated at sums as high as \$150,000,000.

The will gave Mrs. Nanaline H. Duke, for life the Duke Fifth avenue property, "Rough Point" at Newport, R. I., and "Lynwood" at Myers Park, N. C. Mrs. Nanaline H. Duke is a second wife, married in 1907.

The same property goes to Mr. Duke's daughter, Doris, at the death of her mother. The Duke Farms Company, a New Jersey corporation, was ordered dissolved and the funds realized to be distributed to the shore holders.
