Assault Case Is Dismissed

Witnesses Fail to Appear Against T. H. Fisher

T. H. Fisher's fight for freedom ended this morning before it had hardly begun. It ended so soon, because three of the state's principal witnesses were conspicuous by their absence when time came for Fisher's preliminary hearing before Justice of the Peace Ed Kendall this morning. "There's only one thing I can do," the magistrate said, "and that is to dismiss the case for lack of evidence." Fisher was charged with assault with intent to kill. He was charged with having assaulted Howard Seaver, an employe of the Solomon Butte Lumber company, with a curious weapon, a bag filled with stones. Seaver was brought to a local hospital, suffering from several minor fractures of the skull, but improved rapidly and was discharged from the hospital recently. Seaver was one of the witnesses. Fisher's wife was another and Seaver's mother was the third, who failed to put in an appearance.

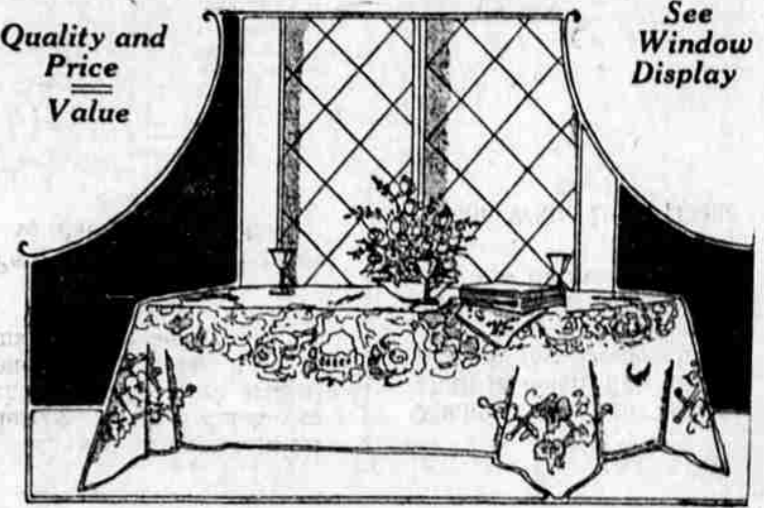
