FACTS, FIGURES; NOT PROPAGANDA CHAMBER'S GOAL

Industrial Committee Meets in Chamber in Second Session Yesterday

An industrial survey, free from "Camo to Klamath" propaganda but bristling with actual facts and figures concerning the industrial and agricultural possibilities of Klamath country.

That is the goal of the new industrial committee of the chamber of commerce which met in its second session yesterday afternoon to outline definite plans for the continuation of this survey.

John C. Boyle is the chamber director in charge of the committee's work and working under him are three sub-committees.

One committee of which Ed Surton is the chairman, will conduct a comprehensive agricultural survey; another for lumber is headed by H. R. Harris; and a third, a combination of both, and industries in general, is led by T. P. Henderson.

The plan of the committee, after the survey is drawn up, is to submit the facts and figures to interested industrial concerns which are, or might be, induced to establish manufacturing plants in Klamath.

The committee while feeling that there is a time and place for propaganda, takes the position that industrial concerns will want plain facts and plain figures concerning the Klamath country, rather than an overdose of exaggerated generalities.

STATE TRAFFIC OFFICER WARNS AUTO DRIVERS

Must Have Lights Adjusted or Will Be Arrested, Is Ultimatum

"If you haven't adjusted your lights, in compliance with the new state lighting law, do so immediately."

This is the ultimatum to Klamath motorists delivered today by Walter A. Foster, state traffic officer.

"Sufficient time has elapsed for motorists to comply with the law, which went into effect last month," Foster said. "I am not arresting automobile drivers outright, but instead am notifying all those who have not had their lights changed, to do so immediately. I am taking the numbers of those I notify and if they fail to respond to my advice I will arrest them the next time I see them."

The state traffic man pointed out that the light adjusting station in Klamath Falls were not rushed as they were a few weeks ago, indicating that automobile drivers are not active in having their lights readjusted.

Crapser Case Is Dismissed By Magistrate

J. of P. Kendall Thinks It's Only a Family Row

Just a family row and not a fit case for the criminal courts.

This was the position of Justice of the Peace Ed Kendall this morning in dismissing the charge of assault with intent to kill against Mrs. Nettie Crapser of Bonanza.

Mrs. Crapser's preliminary hearing did not last long, an hour at the most. The witnesses for the state were present and testified as to the alleged assault of the woman upon her husband.

Mrs. Crapser was charged with having threatened her husband, Benjamin Crapser, with death while holding a gun.

The action of the justice of the peace this morning is but another chapter in the apparently unhappy domestic life of the Crapser family, residing on a little ranch on the Loretta road east of Bonanza.

The last chapter will probably be fought out in the divorce courts. The husband has filed suit for divorce in circuit court and in the near future it will come before Judge A. L. Leavitt.

SIX GOVERNORS AGAINST TAXES ON INHERITANCE

WASHINGTON, Oct. 23.—(AP)—Abandonment by the federal government to the states of revenue from inheritance taxes was asked by half a dozen governors of southern states today before the house ways and means committee.

Imposition of the levy was described as invasion of state rights and a diversion into the federal treasury of money needed by the states.

General approval was given to suggestions that the federal government continue the tax if full credit is given to states which impose similar levies as means of securing uniformity.

Declarations by committee members that the wealthy could escape the tax by moving to Florida, which has no state inheritance tax, led to proposals for retention of the federal tax as a check.

Secretary Mellon has asked repeal of the federal tax.

Shook Sued for \$4,000 By State Superintendent

Dave Shook, prominent Yonka valley rancher, owes the defunct First States Savings bank the sum of \$4000, according to a complaint filed this afternoon by Frank C. Bramwell, state superintendent of banks.

According to the complaint, Shook borrowed \$4000 from the First States and Savings bank in 1921. When the bank closed its doors, the state banking department took charge of the liquidation of the assets of the bank and the suit filed today by the bank superintendent is in line with the desire of the department to realize on all the bank's assets.

City Allowed to Get Fine Money on Lien

BEND, Ore., Oct. 24.—The city may attach, seize and secure judgment on property in lieu of a fine in municipal court but may not accept a bill of sale for the goods from the owner. This was the ruling of Circuit Judge T. E. J. Duffy here yesterday in the case of Chester Brook estate against the city of Bend.

A car valued at \$50 was involved in the suit which has been appealed by the city court after losing in justice court. The fine was assessed on Chester Brook in December 1924 and he had later made partial payments to the city to redeem the property. In May, 1925, Brook returned to his home late at night, shot and killed his wife and then committed suicide.

The court held that while the action of the city of Bend was perfectly legal, it was not good policy, since it might lead to settlements being made directly with the arresting officer. In the case involved the bill of sale was accepted by the police judge who sent the chief of police to appraise the property.
