Mrs. Twombly is the first victim of a small typhoid epidemic that broke out in Klamath Falls over a month ago. She is survived by her husband, Percy Twombly, who is employed at the Klamath Superior laundry, and an eight year old daughter. Funeral services will be announced tomorrow.
