

M'CALL DESIRES LIGHT AT P. O.

Council Transacts Much Routine Business in Session Last Night

A postoffice is more or less of a civic center, a community gathering place, and as such it is entitled to a street light. Such is the position of Postmaster John McCall who appeared before the council last night to ask the council to establish a light on the corner of Ninth and Klamath, the new location of the post office. The postmaster's petition was referred to the light committee.

Resignation of A. O. Dunn, assistant fire chief, was announced last night to the council by Fire Chief Keith K. Ambrose. At the recommendation of Chief Ambrose, the mayor appointed L. E. Sullivan as foreman to fill in the opening left by Dunn's resignation.

Pressure of private business was given by Dr. A. A. Soule as his reason for resigning his position as a member of the boxing commission. Dr. G. S. Newsom, county health officer, was appointed by the mayor to succeed Dr. Soule.

Some time this week, the council will convene in special session for the purpose of passing a number of ordinances for the sale of paving bonds.

The sum of \$165, which composed the street sign fund, will soon be in the hands of the Lakeside Lumber company, from whom 209 sign posts were purchased. The clerk was authorized to pay the lumber company the amount.

The American Legion, represented by its commander, F. R. Olds, asked the council for \$250 of \$450 turned over to the city by the boxing commission. Commander Olds stated it would be utilized for equipping the legion memorial building.

He pointed out that when the commission turned the money over to the city, that it was stipulated that the money be used for a public gymnasium.

The council was disposed to regard Mr. Olds' proposition favorably, but Mayor Goddard opposed it on the ground that the money should be used for play ground equipment.

Will Start Work Soon on Library

Ground will be broken this fall for the new city library building, on the corner of Fifth and Klamath avenue. It was decided last night by the city council. An ordinance empowering the council to let the contract for the construction of the municipal building will be considered by the council next Monday night.

It is the belief of C. N. Coeboom, architect who drew the plans for the structure, that the basement and foundations could be completed before winter weather.

Money for the building was authorized by the people at a bond election last fall, when the people voted \$50,000 to be used for this purpose.

T. Owen Case to Go to Jury Today

Circuit court room rang this afternoon with arguments for and against T. M. Owen, on trial on a statutory charge involving a 17-year-old girl.

W. A. West, deputy district attorney, completed his opening statement just before noon and Fay Morris, attorney for the defendant, started his final argument at 1:30 p. m. The case will go to the jury late this afternoon, according to present indications.

HARRY WILLS IS WINNER OF BOUT

Floyd Johnson Quits in Opening Round With Negro Heavyweight

NEWARK, N. J., Oct. 27. (AP)—Harry Wills today had a quick but indecisive one round heavyweight victory over Floyd Johnson to his credit.

While ten thousand spectators in the First Regiment Armory yelled "Fake," a towel was flung unexpectedly from the corner of the boxer who had been heralded before the match as the "Iowa bull dog" what was to have been a 12 round, no decision event ended two minutes and two seconds after the opening of the first round last night.

Johnson appeared to the spectators to be far from out when the towel fluttered. He was on his feet and had not been knocked down.

After the match, a physician representing the state boxing commission, examined Johnson and declared he was fit.

"I was pinch-drunk," said Johnson.

Wills entered the ring weighing 215 pounds, 12 more than his opponent. The negro immediately carried the fight to his opponent, sinking a left to the stomach and then bringing the same hand up to the head. A right hand wallop to the head then drove Johnson to the ropes. He had his hands up in defense when the towel was flung.
