Trambitas And Starkey To Go Fast 10 Rounds

Real Interest Shown in Fight Card For Tuesday

What will Kid Starkey, Klamath battler, do against another boy of coast wide reputation?

This is the question fans are asking and which will be answered at Scandinavian hall next Tuesday night when the local boy will meet Johnnie Trambitas in the 10-round main event which Matchmaker Sylvester and the boxing commission have arranged.

Starkey's showing against Mike De Pinto two weeks ago in which he should have been given the decision, boosted the local boy's stock by a series of leaps and bounds, and his friends are looking to see him give the youngest member of the Trambitas family a real lacing.

In the semi-windup, Chuck Sams and Earl Stolz will renew the feud which they started two weeks ago when they battled to a terrific six-round draw. Sams looked to be in much better condition now, and it will not be surprising if he stops the Bond boy.

The special event is creating a lot of genuine interest throughout the county. This will bring together Wilbur Harrington, Klamath Indian, and Jack Grim, Modoc Indian. An injury which Harrington sustained three weeks ago has entirely healed and he has resumed hard training for the coming match. A goodly share of the reservation population is expected here for this battle.

Henry Burke, erstwhile wrestler, is training hard with the padded gloves for his first appearance as a box-fighter. His opponent for the opening event of the card will be selected tonight, Sylvester said. It is possible that he will be matched with Joe Walters.

Catholic Mission To Start Sunday at Sacred Heart

Beginning next Sunday morning at 10:30 the annual mission for Sacred Heart parish will be opened with a high mass in Sacred Heart church and will continue for one week. The services throughout the week will be held each evening at 7:30 and each morning at 6 and 8 o'clock. The mission will be conducted by Rev. William S. McDermott, a noted missionary of the Dominican order. In connection with this mission, Rev. Father Loewer, pastor of Sacred Heart parish, says:

"These missions are not alone for Catholics, but are, as well, for those who do not belong to our faith but who are desirous of learning just what the Catholic church teaches. To these a special invitation is extended and I can assure them that nothing will be said to wound the most sensitive feeling. If they come to the mission they will doubtless have wiped out many of the false ideas they may have about our beliefs."

At the close of the mission in this city, Father McDermott will go to Merrill, where he will hold a mission from November 3 to November 12. The hours of service will be the same as those in this city.

The eyes and thoughts of authorities on wild bird life are directed toward Klamath these days. All because of the Klamath duck epidemic, in which so many thousands of the game birds have succumbed from some mysterious disease. Stanley G. Jewett, as head of the biological survey work in Klamath, is interested, and so is George Tonking, U. S. game warden of Sacramento, who is expected in Klamath Falls this afternoon. Mr. Jewett arrived in Klamath Falls last night from Portland and put up at the Hall hotel. He is here on one of his general inspection trips but will remain here long enough to attend a predatory animal control meeting which is to be held in the county court house next Saturday afternoon. In all probability he will confer with local authorities on latest developments in the duck situation.
