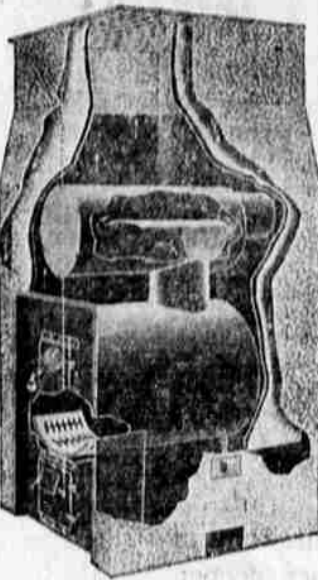


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KLAMATH COUNTRY CORRESPONDENCE

Workmen Recover From Local Road

Robert E. Strahorn, president of the Oregon California and Eastern railroad must pay to 12 former employees the sum of \$3858.74, according to a judgment handed down today by Circuit Judge A. L. Leavitt. If he fails to pay the money, foreclosure proceedings may be introduced and the railroad property sold to satisfy the judgment.

The suit originated three years ago, when the Nettleton-Bruce-Eschback company of Seattle went bankrupt in completing a contract on the Strahorn road. Strahorn brought suit to recover the \$25,000 surety bond from the bonding company which went on the contracting company's bond. He was awarded judgment for the full amount but failed to settle with the 12 claimants whose wages had not been paid, who were awarded judgment yesterday.

CHICAGO, Oct. 29.—(AP)—A struggle for future control of the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul railroad, valued at \$1,100,000,000, has begun before Federal Judge James H. Wilkinson.

The two factions are the Kuhn-Loeb group, which, with the National City Bank had charge of recent financing of the railroad, and stockholders led by Roosevelt and son, New York bankers. The latter represent \$23,000,000 worth of stock.
