play an important part in the forth-  
coming election, for it is deter-  
mined to try and secure control of the  
board and then rescind the resolu-  
tion.

The resolution that passed be-  
fore the irrigation district, the re-  
clamation service and Congressman  
Sinnott, bearing upon the state-  
ment purported to have been issued  
by Mead, follows:

Klamath Falls, Ore.  
October 21, 1925.  
Honorable Elwood Mead  
Commissioner of Reclamation  
Washington, D. C.

Will you please advise as to present  
status of negotiations of con-  
tract for operation and maintenance  
of the district. This matter has  
been before your department for a  
considerable time. Also please ad-  
vise regarding relief matters which  
we understood should have the early  
attention of your department after  
sitting of your Board of Review and  
Adjustment. We believe you ap-  
preciate the importance of these  
matters to the district and necessity  
for immediate action by your de-  
partment. District has fully com-  
plied with all requirements fact  
finders act and is entitled to partic-  
ipate in the benefits conferred  
by the same. Our understanding  
is that your bureau has full au-  
thority to afford relief in this mat-  
ter.

company for years 1920 to 1924.

A copy of this wire was sent to  
Congressman N. J. Sinnott and a  
further message sent Mr. Sinnott  
as follows:

Klamath Falls, Ore.  
October 23, 1925.  
Hon. N. J. Sinnott,  
Washington, D. C.

Please get from Elwood Mead and  
wire us collect his full statement  
relative to Klamath project released  
to press October 22. Demand from  
him names of four large land owners  
referred to therein and include them  
in your wire. Reclamation Bureau  
attempting to influence forthcom-  
ing water election this year as they  
did last. District bitterly resents  
this and will contest it in every  
way in its power.

Klamath Irrigation District.  
To which Sinnott replied:  
Washington, D. C.  
October 24, 1925.

Klamath Irrigation District,  
Klamath Falls, Oregon.  
Your night message received. Dr.  
Mead out of city will not return till  
thirty-first. Secretary in his office  
informed me that she does not think  
the Doctor gave out a formal re-  
lease but she will confer with news-  
paper correspondent who talked to  
Dr. Mead and give me what infor-  
mation can be gathered. Secretary  
thinks that the land owners are the  
Enterprise Land Company. Will  
wire you today or Monday when I  
get more definite information.

N. J. Sinnott.  
On the 27th instant the district  
wired the Bureau of Reclamation as  
follows:

Klamath Falls, Ore.  
October 27, 1925.  
Hon. Elwood Mead,  
Commissioner of Reclamation  
Washington, D. C.

Having received no reply to my  
telegram addressed to you regarding  
interview given by you October 23,  
must presume that you are correct-  
ly quoted. Your statement to the  
press indicates either that your in-  
formation was incorrect or that you  
purposely misstated conditions af-  
fecting the Klamath Irrigation dis-  
trict. Your statement that individ-  
ual land owners of the district are  
delinquent to the United States is  
not correct. The president of the  
board did not order the sheriff of  
Klamath county to eliminate from  
the taxroll all of the unpaid taxes  
of the Enterprise Land and Invest-  
ment company for the years 1920 to  
1924 inclusive. Your intimation  
favoritism which was shown is with-  
out foundation in fact and indicates  
antagonism against the president of  
the district whom you accuse of  
unlawful acts. Your appeal to the  
water users to require their officers  
to take action in regard to delin-  
quencies and directing their at-  
tention to alleged remission of taxes  
was entirely outside the province  
and duties of the Commissioner of  
Reclamation and denotes a desire  
to interfere in the internal affairs  
of the water users. Your failure to  
answer our telegram of inquiry re-  
garding pending contract between  
the United States and the district,  
and your stand against the inclusion  
of the paragraph referring to the  
control of lake levels which pro-  
vides for payments to be credited to  
the district for water diverted for  
power use as provided by act of  
congress, also your delay in apply-  
ing the provisions of the fact find-  
ers act which provides for reduced  
payments and other relief which  
would reduce the district assess-  
ments might lead to the supposition  
that your interview was given out  
to influence voters at the pending  
election for directors of the district,  
we having in mind the Soutemeyer  
Dent report released just prior to the  
last district election for the purpose  
of retaining a board of directors  
referred to in the report as the ad-  
ministration candidates. You take  
advantage of your position as Com-  
missioner of Reclamation to cast  
aspersions on the character of in-  
dividuals by publishing statements  
without foundation supported by  
facts. You are respectfully request-  
ed to substantiate your statements  
or publicly correct them.

project. Dr. Mead is out of city and  
will not return until October thirty-  
one. Am sending you copy of above  
letter.

Bureau of Reclamation that any  
statement for publication had been  
issued from that office the district  
wired the Portland Oregonian as  
follows:

Oregonian October twenty-three

ped by Mead, in which president  
Klamath Irrigation district is criti-  
cized. Following telegram received

"Further replying to your night twenty-  
third I am just in receipt of letter  
from P. W. Dent, acting commis-  
sioner, stating that Dr. Mead has  
issued no statement for publication  
relative to the Klamath project."

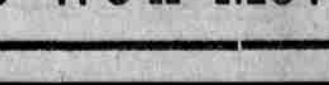
