Johnnie Trambitas To Arrive Tonight For Battle With Kid Starkey Next Tuesday Evening

Portland Lightweight Will Work Out Tomorrow Afternoon—Sams-Stolz Go And Harington-Crim Battle May Be Knock-outs

Johnnie Trambitas left Portland by auto early this morning and will arrive here late tonight, according to a telegram received from the little Portland scrapper by Matchmaker Johnnie Sylvester. He will work out at Scandinavian hall tomorrow afternoon for his 10-round bout with Kid Starkey, Klamath lightweight, next Tuesday evening.

Those who have seen both Trambitas and Starkey in action are predicting that the bout will be far faster and more furious than the one two weeks ago between Starkey and Mike De Pinto. De Pinto was content to let Starkey do most of the leading, but Trambitas fights on the same order as the local boy. He keeps wading in, always ready to take a couple in order to land one.

REFUGEE TELLS OF HOSTILITIES

Britisher Gives First Report of Bombardment of Damascus Recently

LONDON, Oct. 30.—(P)—A dispatch to the Daily Mail from Jerusalem quotes the statements of a "reliable British refugee" enroute from Damascus regarding his experiences during the recent bombardment there. "On Monday morning, October 19," said the refugee, "the French vacated the entire Christian quarter, which then was at the mercy of the Moslem robbers. I realized that it was unsafe for the missionaries to remain, unprotected from the fire of the French guns at the citadel and Salehiye quarter, so, with a Moslem police escort, I took eleven British and American missionaries to the British hospital.

"On their arrival the police donned plain clothes and hid their rifles. About 5,000 Christians availed themselves of the protection of the British hospital. Tuesday morning I tried several times to telephone the British and American consuls but all wires were cut and there was nothing to do but to get through at the risk of my life. I met a servant of the American consul, who had been cut off from the consulate for two days, and we walked from the Christian quarter through the Arab French lines to the Salehiye quarter, where the British consulate stands.

"We were unable to reach it, as the consulate was cut off. It had been hit during the firing. "I arrived at the Victoria hotel and found it deserted, but the telephone was in working order, so I telephoned the American consul. He told me he had been assured by the high commissioners delegate and the military authorities that the Christian quarters was quiet.

"The casualties were estimated at several thousand Syrians killed and about three hundred French. There were many instances of cold blooded shooting by French soldiers. Three of them were seen making a Moslem dig his own grave. He then was shot and buried in it.

"When I left Damascus by train heavy fighting was taking place."

2500 Leave Klamath Falls for Union Meat Company in San Francisco

Another consignment of 2500 fat lambs left Klamath Falls, southward bound for the Union Meat company in San Francisco. The shipment, which is the next to last of lamb shipments that will be sent to the San Francisco concern, was taken from the large flocks of Patty Quinlan and Pat O'Keefe.

"The California meat concern contracted to purchase 20,000 lambs from different sheep men in Klamath and throughout the late summer and early fall have been calling for the lambs as market demand in the Bay cities manifested. The last shipment of 1500 sheep, will leave soon. Charles F. DeLap, veteran livestock buyer, took a prominent part in the original purchase and has been supervising their shipment.

SCHOOL FOR CHEER LEADERS FEATURES LOYAL LEADERS

LAFAYETTE, Ind.—Leather lungs and a capacity for backhand somersaults are less essential in a college golf leader than the sparks of leadership which enables him to mold the mob into a loyal unit.

Prof. Preston H. Scott thus lectures to Purdue University classes in cheer leading.

Scott is tutoring the embryo rooster kings of the Bullwinkle school of mob psychology. The course in cheer leading was offered this year for the first time in any western conference university. Fifty students are enrolled. Its aim is to develop a type of college yelling which will inspire Purdue athletic teams to climb from the cellar position in which they have repeated too consistently in almost every major sport.

"A cheer leader of the right type," Scott says, "wields a vast power for good over campus opinion."

Human beings collectively become unable to listen to reason, clinging eagerly to mass opinion. This mass opinion may be started into action by a few rowdies, by a fumble on the football field, by anything that can claim attention.

"Yet a cheer leader with the crowd's confidence can check its rowdiness with a word, subdue its panic, and change grumbling into cheers for the man who fumbled. No other phase of college life is so dominated by a single individual."

Men who can qualify as cheer leaders, he says, will find in later life that they have developed ability for leadership in other fields.
