### Wealthy Farm Owner Passes

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 29.—A Fletcher Lockwood, wealthy owner of a model farm between Salem and Turner, where he and his wife had lived for the last six years, died in his sleep last night at his home. He had not been ill. Lockwood was a nephew of Andrew Fletcher, president of the W. and A. Fletcher company, steamship outfitters of Hoboken, N. J., and president of the American Locomotive works. He was born and raised in New York City and was 44 years old at his death. He came to Portland, Ore., when a young man, lived there a number of years, then moved to the Hood River district and later to Salem.

He bought a farm in a very ordinary condition here six years ago, but improved it until it was looked upon as a model. He recently completed a barn with cork floors, steel supports and with exterior finish of concrete and tile. He had planned the construction of a house. He is survived by his widow.

Otherwise the starting line-up will be the same as that of a week ago, and long drills on defense against the Montana attack gives hope that O. A. C. may yet take the game. Starting time has been set at 1:30.
