FORMER BREWERS NOW SERVE AS U. S. PROHIBITION AGENTS

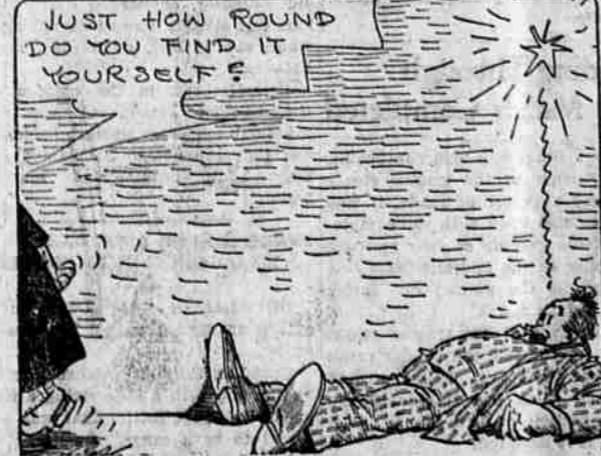

The brew master or dry agent is stationed at near-beer plants suspected of violating the law, with instructions to test each barrel of product that is hauled to the loading platform.
