### RED CROSS ROLL CALL WILL START

The ninth annual membership enrollment of the American National Red Cross Society will start roll call November 11, Armistice Day, and continue through Thanks-

giving Day, November 26. Roll call chairman for the Klamath Falls chapter is Mrs. Howard R. Perrin, one of the city's most attentive social welfare workers. "Anyone wishing to work for the worthy cause would greatly facilitate matters by volunteering his or her services," said Mrs. Perrin, who can be reached by telephone at 250-J.

A house to house canvass will be conducted with the hope of getting a hundred per cent membership. Besides the canvass of homes at the intensive period of the drive, booths, manned by young women of the city will be placed at the busy corners along Main street. The Boy Scouts will be offered an opportunity to add to their lists of "services performed" by assisting in the canvassing work after school and on Saturdays, according to Mrs. Perrin. Other features of the campaign will be a song composed by local musicians, which will be played and sung until the tune is on the tip of every tongue and if it is not being sung it will be whistled along the streets by patriotic residents.

It might be well to recall to mind the fact that only half of the price of a membership goes to the national organization. The remaining fifty cents of a dollar membership goes to local charity. The purposes of the organization are: To furnish aid to the sick and wounded of armies in time of war; to perform all the duties devolved upon a na-

tional society by each nation which has acceded to said treaty (of Geneva); to act in matters of voluntary relief and in accord with the military and naval authorities as a medium of communication between people of the United States and their Army and Navy; and to mitigate suffering in time of peace, caused by pestilence, famine, fire, floods, and other great national calamities.

### Building For October Beats Past Records

\$154,708 Invested in Construction During Past Month

Significant, in that it points to a rapid yet substantial growth in building and population, is the record of \$154,708 spent in Klamath Falls during the month of October in building construction.

Features of the month's building may be summed up with two observations: (1) That it is the highest October building record ever experienced in Klamath Falls; (2) That substantial homes are rising in the place of the shacks and minute frame structures that have characterized construction activities in many residence districts.

#### Better Homes

Of the 79 building permits granted by the council for the month, 37 were for new homes. And of these 37 new homes, 18 cost \$100 or over with the remaining 19 under \$1000. Compared with the past, this is a remarkable record, indicating that residents of Klamath Falls are regarding their city, not as a place to make their money and get out, but a city in which they will make their permanent home. Past construction records reveal that the great majority of homes cost under \$1000 and most of them under \$500.

#### Sets New Record

With \$154,708 representing October building investment, the city has set a new October record. October, 1924, which had set a record up to that time, represented a building investment of \$131,725.

Not despite the splendid record of last month, building activity for the first ten months of 1925 is slightly under that for the first ten months of 1924. From January 1, 1925, to November 1, 1925, the sum of \$1,534,995 has been expended in construction. For the same period in 1924, the records show that \$1,615,390 has been expended. However, it is recalled that the 1924 record was particularly high because of the half million dollar investment in a power house by the California Oregon Power company.

### VACCINATION IS DENIED SEVERAL SCHOOL PUPILS

Parents Intervene in Health Measure; Children Are Isolated

There were several parents of eighth grade pupils in Central school that could not understand the need of having their children vaccinated against smallpox, so these children must remain isolated for 18 days before returning to school. This was the edict of County Health Officer Newsom, Saturday. One case of smallpox had broken out in Central school's eighth grade. To protect the rest of the children, vaccination of all the pupils in that room was necessary. Most of the parents of the children complied with the request of the health officer and the children returned this morning to school.

But those who refused to allow their children to submit to vaccination must keep their children home and isolated for 18 days.
