County Money Is Needed To Fight Coyote

Biological Service Can Not Relieve Situation

"Heaven helps those who help themselves." This is the expression from the lips of Charles G. Poole, head of the United States Biological Survey work in California, sums up the deliberations and findings at the predatory animal control meeting Saturday afternoon in the county court rooms.

The meeting, which was initiated by the Klamath Wool Growers' association and County Agent C. A. Henderson, was for the purpose of arriving at a more effective and co-operative plan of predatory animal control work in southern Oregon and northern California.

Representatives of Klamath and Modoc counties were present. Lake county made its position clear through a letter read by A. M. Thomas, secretary of the Klamath Wool Growers' Association.

If the counties want better and more comprehensive control measures enforced, then let them pay for it, in the way Mr. Poole and Stanley G. Jewett, head of the biological survey work in Oregon put it.

Siskiyou by establishing the bounty plan for coyote control work was eliminated from consideration in the cooperative plan.

Both Mr. Poole and Mr. Jewett emphasized that the maximum amount of money for the southern Oregon and northern California counties is being expended by the Biological Survey.

They pointed out that if it was felt there was need for greater control work, finances for the work must come from the county. G. W. Lyon, supervisor of the Modoc national forest, suggested a scheme for raising additional money in Modoc county. He suggested a certain assessment from each Modoc county livestockman, to pay for the work.

"Those that refuse to pay for the additional control work, we can exclude from national forest range until they see fit to change their minds," Mr. Lyon said.

Lake county, through a letter from its county judge, is behind any cooperative coyote control measure and will soon appropriate \$2000 to be used in control work.
