

Paris Decrees Larger Waists For This Year

PARIS, Nov. 2. (AP)—The girl of last summer—the sprightly elf of boyish shapeliness has disappeared. Paris has banished her, admitting after several seasons of denial, that women have waists.

Midsession models designed for Palm Beach and southern European wear, and the forerunner of modes for next spring and summer, place the waist line very near normal. The belt not only has returned but is farther up than it has been for years.

Proud owners of 32 inch waists need not begin to pluck them in, for although belts and bask are nearly

back where Eve's modiste placed them—they are not pulled in. They are simply there, as loose as the dress itself—more as a thing of decoration than of utility.

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FRANCE SEEKING COMPLETE FACTS

PARIS, Nov. 2. (AP)—General Sarrail, France's high commissioner in Syria, who has been reticent with regard to recent fighting in Syria and especially Damascus, which underwent a severe bombardment, has been ordered home by the government to furnish a full explanation of the situation.

He will not return to his post, for a decision has been reached by Premier Painleve and his cabinet that instead of a military commissioner a civilian henceforth will take up the task of supervising the mandated territory.

The French cabinet for several days has been much perturbed over the representations reaching it from American and British official sources regarding the bombardment of Damascus by the French artillerists from October 18 to 20.

Lengthy descriptions were given in these reports of amazing and extraordinary incidents accompanying the shelling. The British consul in Damascus in his report to the British foreign office, which conveyed its contents to the French government, described it "By General Sarrail's regime.

The French authorities have not endeavored to hide their displeasure over the trouble between the French and Syrian tribesmen. Before announcement was made last evening that General Sarrail was to be recalled there was a direct interdiction that this will be the culmination of the killing of great numbers of populace of Damascus and the razing of a large part of the city by the shells of the French guns. This came in a remark of the minister of the interior Schrameck, when asked if the high commissioner was not to be recalled.

TURKISH TROOPS GOING TO MOSUL

LONDON, Nov. 2. (AP)—A dispatch to the Daily Mail from Beirut, Syria, says large bodies of Turkish troops are moving toward Mosul from Turkey.

The Daily Express has a similar report which puts the number of Turks at 5,000 and alleges that the French have given them permission to cross Syria.

The report says Great Britain has protested to the French government.

The suggestion is that the French commanders in Syria are favoring the Turkish preparations to check British action against the Mosul boundary.
