"Barney" Chambers Offers Solution Of Duck Scourge

As a means of preventing a recurrence next year of the scourge which has infected thousands of the ducks near Tule lake, Barney Chambers of the Gun Store today came forward with an offer to head a subscription list with \$200 for the purpose of gathering up all the dead carcasses of the ducks and having them burned.

"In the interests of the sport, I think something like this should be done at once," said Mr. Chambers today. "If those ducks are allowed to remain there they will pollute the water indefinitely and spoil duck hunting in that section next year."

That the epidemic has made its inroads on the business life in Klamath Falls is an admitted fact. The Klamath country and Tule lake country are known far and wide as the sportsmen's paradise and hundreds of hunters from various parts of the west have been kept from coming by the serious duck epidemic.

C. A. Henderson, county agent, declared that a plan such as proposed by Mr. Chambers should be investigated at once as a means of bringing the epidemic to a halt. If the sportsmen can be interested in the proposal it is probable that immediate steps will be taken to gather the fund

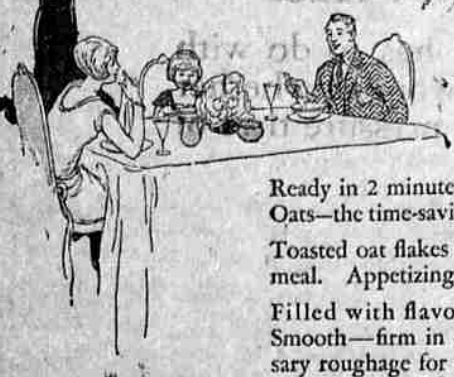

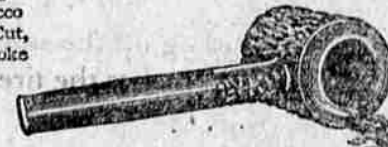
