With Deputy Sheriff Jim Hilton, Owens was taken north to Salem this morning and will arrive there some time this evening.

Owens, before sentence, by Judge A. L. Leavitt, was adjudged by reputable physicians to be chronically tubercular. If his physical condition warrants, he will be given medical treatment at the state prison.

LEIGHTON BUZZARD, REDFORDSHIRE, England, Nov. 4.—(AP)—The Prince of Wales took his first tumble today from horseback since returning to England from his South African and South American journey. The fall came in the course of an exciting fox hunt when the prince's horse failed to take an awkward fence. The prince was unhurt.

The prince's hunt had been chasing a fox for 1 hour and the hounds were in full cry. Coming to a fence with a big ditch in front of it, his horse failed to take the jump and both the prince and his mount disappeared into the watery chasm. The prince scrambled out unhurt but his horse was mired and was released only with difficulty. The royal huntsman then gave up the chase and returned to London.

## Aged Oldsmobiles Stage Unique Race

They held an automobile race in Huntington Park, near Los Angeles recently that did not exceed the speed limit. It was a battle between three old timers and, while no records were made, it showed the great strides the automotive industry has made in less than a quarter of a century. The race was won by a 1902 Oldsmobile, which heated two other makes of about the same age. At times the Olds dashed along at a rate of fully 15 miles an hour. Small boys were carried in the "racers" either as ballast or to help push, if necessary. The unique contest was staged by Leslie R. Lumley, Huntington Park Oldsmobile dealer.
