and over four miles right of way for U. S. R. S. laterals B, C, D, and F. The company was promised water on all its 160 acres signed up. At the present time, 16 years after signing up, one-half mile of lateral B has never been constructed. One eighth mile of lateral C has not been constructed and one mile of lateral D has not been constructed.

The result is that 85.8 acres of our 160 acre unit upon which the United States is under contract to furnish irrigation, has never had one drop of water.

Refusing to believe that the United States, through its officials in the Department of Interior, would deliberately violate a written contract, the Enterprise Land and Investment company paid construction charges and maintenance and operation to the United States for 11 years, 1909 to 1919, inclusive, for service never furnished.

Being informed in 1920 by G. W. Offield and his board, that neither the U. S. Reclamation Service nor the Board of the Klamath Irrigation District would keep the contract with us or furnish any irrigation to 85.8 acres of our land, we, thereupon notified the Offield board not to levy any further taxes for irrigation, not to be furnished, as an illegal and uncollectible tax. For motives of petty spite and in an endeavor to annoy and cause loss and embarrassment to the Enterprise Land & Investment company, the Offield board continued to levy later taxes on 85.8 acres over protest.

By their unlawful action we were compelled to allow delinquencies to pile up on our property as the Tax Collector refused to accept any payments unless we paid these unlawful taxes.

Offield and Nylander boards did not dare to proceed against us for delinquency and left that matter to be adjusted by the present board. In April 1925, a public hearing was ordered under provision of the

General Laws or Oregon and publication of notice as by law provided, on the application of the Enterprise Land and Investment company for exclusion of 25.8 acres, for the reason that no irrigation had ever been furnished and because of the "dog in the manger" attitude of the U. S. Reclamation Service which would neither build laterals, for which they had been given lands, nor let any one else build them. And for the further reason that said 85.8 acres is non-agricultural and not fitted for growing crops. The board of land classification appointed by the United States has since confirmed the non-agricultural character of this land and justified the action of the board in excluding this 85.8 acres from the district. The exclusion of the lands necessarily cancelled the illegal taxes levied upon them. The illegal tax on this 85.8 acres actually levied from 1920-24 was \$969.27,—not \$2,000 as the Klamath News states as a fact. (See

Tax Records in Sheriff's Office.) extreme in its lawlessness and disregard and contempt of property rights that has occurred in the long and vicious history of the United States Reclamation Service. That any official of the government or any district official trying to hide behind the U. S. R. S., would dare to openly attempt confiscation of property by piling illegal taxes on the land for irrigation which for 15 years they did not furnish and never intended to furnish, shows the measure of lawlessness which Washington Bureaucrats will attempt upon remote and defenseless water users who may happen to offend them or their henchmen and confederates. So far as the Enterprise Land and Investment company is concerned it will hereafter pay no tax for irrigation unless the United States and the Irrigation District keep their part of the contract and furnish water. NO WATER—NO PAY, and the laws of Oregon will uphold us.
