WARREN COMPANY AGREES TO FIX 10TH ST. PAVING

Construction Company will Undertake Repair Work Free of Any Cost

WORK STARTED SOON

Rutty and Bumpy Street to be Improved from Pine to Lincoln Street

Announcement was made this morning that Tenth street from Pine to Lincoln streets would be repaved, at no expense to the city, by the Warren Construction company.

The announcement was made public by Major W. E. Arnold, superintendent of paving jobs in Klamath Falls, on which Warren Construction company bid successfully.

The work will be started as soon as paving work on streets within improvement districts is completed. It will mean an expenditure of several thousand dollars for the Warren Construction company.

Disintegration of Tenth street from Lincoln south to Pine has been hastened by the heavy auto truck travel, from paving plants and rock crushers north of town. Anxious to show the public their good will in the matter, the Warren Construction company authorized Major Arnold's report on the street situation.

Ruts and breaks in the pavement will be torn out and new pavement will be poured in the holes and rolled.

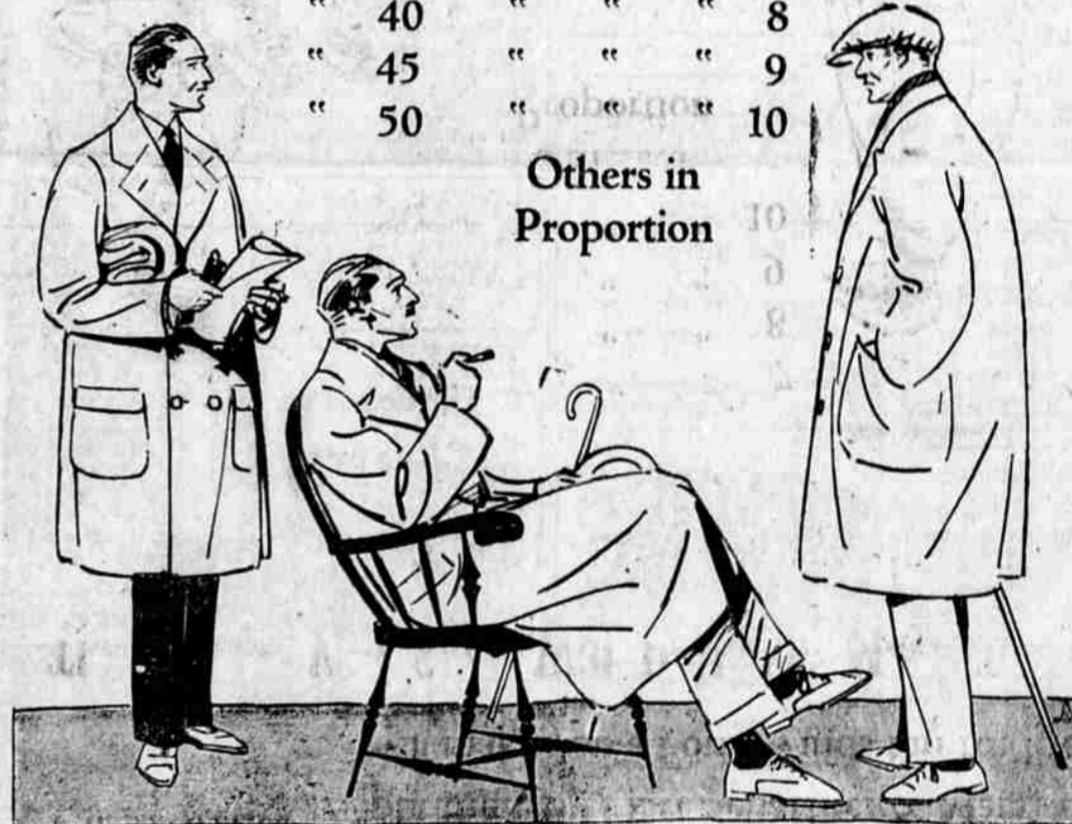

Scouts to Stage Picture Contest

With attractive prizes being offered by many of the leading merchants in the city, local scouts are showing keen interest in the photo competition exhibition, which is under way, according to Everett O. Nord, scout executive. All registered Scouts of Klamath county are invited to enter pictures. Entries to close December 15, 1925. This will be an annual affair and it is hoped that all the scouts enter photographs in one or all classes. The photographs that are awarded prizes will be hung for exhibition in a place easily accessible to the public who are cordially invited to call and view the exhibit. The merit of each picture will be decided by competent judges who will be vested with authority to hand only those pictures which they judge worthy. All scout officials are invited to enter pictures, for exhibition only, so as

to make the display as large as possible.

Here are the rules:

1. A scout who enters the contest must be a registered scout now, but not necessarily at the time the picture was taken.
2. His pictures must be his own work, the finishing and enlarging may be done by others.
3. Hand colored photographs will not be eligible for competition.
4. Pictures submitted must be at least 5x7 inches or larger, either contact prints or enlargements. They must be mounted on white, light gray, cream or light brown cover paper, none of the mounts to be smaller than 8x10 inches and none larger than 18x22 inches. Framed or rolled pictures will not be accepted except for exhibition.
5. All pictures to be submitted are to be carefully wrapped, legibly addressed and marked with the name of the exhibitor, and delivered at Scout Headquarters in the Chamber of Commerce, on or before December 15, 1925, judging to take

place on the 17th and awards made on the 20th of December.

The title, name and address of the exhibitor, material used and other items of interest should be written plainly on the back of each picture.

No picture to be removed until the end of the exhibition and the pictures that fail to win prizes will be returned to the exhibitors.

Pictures will be classed as follows: Scouting Activities, Wild Life, Pictorial, Miscellaneous.

Awards of first, second and third place ribbons will be made in each class and prizes of photographic and scouting equipment will be offered to scouts making the highest scores. Judges of the contest are as follows: R. E. Stinson, C. S. Curran, A. L. Rice, J. A. Gordon and the Scout Executive. Prizes are being offered by Stinson's Photo Shop, Curran's Drug Store, Southwell, and Underwood's.
