

OCTOBER HEALTH CONDITIONS ARE REPORTED TODAY

Dr. Newsom Announces Statistics on Disease in Klamath

A brief but serious epidemic of typhoid fever in Klamath Falls, a slight visitation of mumps in the city district and continuation of social diseases are the high lights of the Klamath county health report for October, announced today by Dr. G. S. Newsom, medical director of Klamath county.

There were six cases of typhoid in Klamath, all originating from one dairy. This dairy was forced to suspend business and the epidemic ceased as quickly as it had come.

Epidemic of Mumps

Out in Sprague River valley, a slight wave of mumps swept through the countryside. Seven were ill during the slight epidemic.

Social diseases continued to be as prevalent as ever, according to the report. There were seventeen cases reported to the county health office.

In all, 49 infectious disease cases were reported to the health office. Of this number 29 were placed under quarantine. There were nineteen dairy inspections, to ascertain whether or not conditions in Klamath dairies were conducive to the best health of the community.

Thirty school children were excluded for a short time from school owing to danger of infection, and the room in which they were located thoroughly fumigated.

Through the activities of the city school nurse, minor physical defects of 40 children were corrected.

An idea of the scope of the health office activities may be gained by the monthly mileage report of the office. Dr. Newsom and his two assistants, Miss Lydia Frick and Miss Hazel McClelland, traveled 1509 miles of Klamath roads in the interests of public health. Of this total, Dr. Newsom drove 735 miles; Miss Frick 300 miles; and Miss McClelland, 474 miles.

A review of October reveals that the extensive epidemic of whooping cough has been controlled. But two cases were reported.

Trambitas is fighting main event at Seattle tonight, but will leave early tomorrow for Klamath Falls and will get here late Thursday afternoon, he has informed match-maker Johnnie Sylvester.

The six-round semi-windup between Jack Crim and Wilbur Harrington will produce a lot of vicious glove slinging. These boys don't like each other, and when they square away both will start heaving leather until one of them drops. That's the sort of a fight they put up for four rounds on the last card, and both were nearly out on their feet when the referee called it a draw. With two additional rounds it looks like a certainty one will drop by the K. O. route.

Jack Walters probably will be signed to meet Henry Burke in the four-round curtain raiser. Burke disposed of Kid Sullivan in two rounds on the last card, so he is going to get a tougher fight for his second appearance as a box-fighter. Another four rounder will be signed up within the next day or two to complete the card.

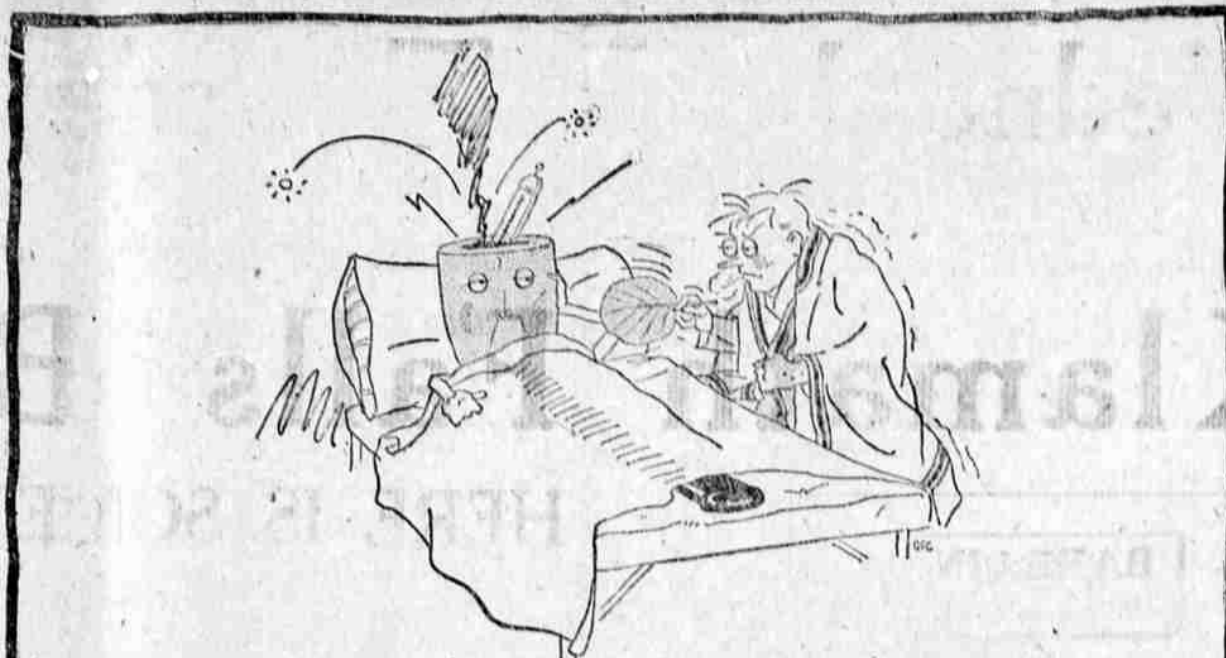
Ford Production Reaches New Mark

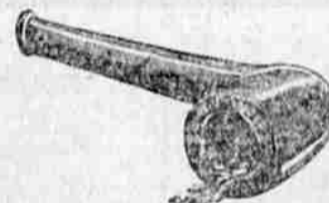
ENROUTE TO BEND

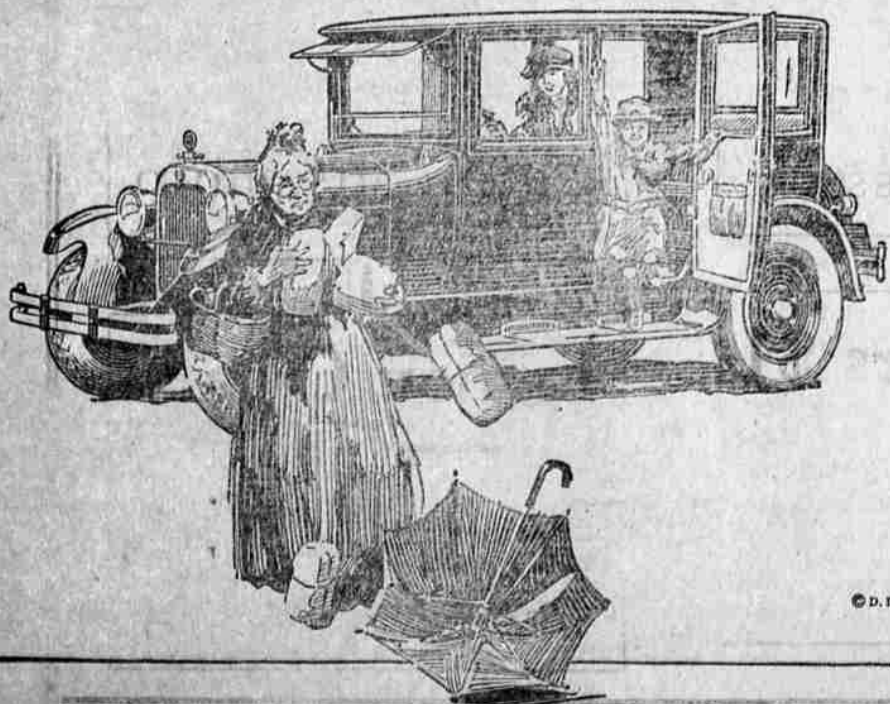
