## Ex-Policeman Goes On Trial

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 11.—(AP)—Leroy Hansen, ex-special city police officer, fired two shots at James Elliott, a friend, before he turned and fatally shot James A. Day in a rooming house at 349 Twelfth street the night of August 16, according to Elliott's testimony before a jury in Circuit Judge Hewitt's court yesterday.

Both shots at Elliott went wild, the witness said. Hansen is on trial before Judge Hewitt on a first degree murder charge.

Elliott said that he and Day had taken a few drinks in Day's apartment and that Day asked him to return an iron which he had borrowed from Mrs. Hansen earlier in the day. Elliott said that he went to the Hansen apartment in the basement and that Hansen began accusing him of trying to force his attention upon Mrs. Hansen. Without warning, Hansen began shooting, Elliott said, and he (Elliott) ran around the house and up Twelfth street.

R. A. Davis, et al, plaintiffs, vs. A. Bertschinger, appellant; appeal from Multnomah county; appeal from decree foreclosing mechanic's lien. Opinion by Justice Hand. Judge Geo. Romanan affirmed.

Wm. A. Dilling vs. Portland Stove-doring Company, appellant; appeal from Multnomah county; motion to dismiss appeal allowed in opinion by Chief Justice McBride. Anthony Nepach, appellant, vs.

Florence C. Norval and Anna E. Norval, executrix of estate of Kate M. Nepach; appeal from Multnomah county. Opinion by Chief Justice McBride. Judge J. M. Hamilton reversed.
