

Klamath Wins From Alturas

Local High Gets Easy 47 to 0 Football Victory

The Klamath high gridsters... the lighter Alturas high into camp yesterday afternoon, thereby adding another win to their long string of victories. The game ended with the score 47 to 0.

The Alturas team put up a hard fight but was not match for the home boys, as Klamath had its own way throughout the game. At no time was the Klamath goal line in danger.

Alturas won the toss and elected to kick. By straight line plunges and spectacular plays by Hall and Yancey, Klamath made three touchdowns in the first quarter. It was in this quarter that Yancey intercepted an Alturas pass and reced 55 yards to a touchdown. The second quarter was a repetition of the first, Hall intercepting a pass and running 50 yards to a touchdown. Near the close of the second quarter Coach French used a bunch of his second string players. The third quarter started with all the first string boys and they marched down the field scoring almost at will.

Coach French gave his second string players another chance in the last quarter and the game ended with Klamath on the lead end of a 47 to 0 score, ending a very successful season for the home boys, having been beaten only by Madford. Much credit can be given Coach French for this remarkable showing, and the team no doubt will be of championship calibre next season.

Union County Big Borrower

Gets More School Fund Money Than Others

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 12. — With loans from the common school fund of the state aggregating \$526,754, Union county is the heaviest borrower among all the counties of the state from that fund, says a statement prepared by G. G. Brown, clerk of the state land board.

At the close of business October 30, the total loans from the school fund were \$6,881,412.85, while rural credit loans aggregated \$421,324.51. In loans from the school fund Wheeler county is second with \$424,048.

Marion county's loans from the school fund are \$278,993.13 and from the rural credits fund \$29,305.90. Lane county has loans aggregating \$113,366 from the school fund and \$21,404.51 from the rural credits fund. Deschutes county's loans from the two funds are \$95,270 and \$4831.60 respectively, and Umatilla county's loans from the two funds are \$217,405 and \$4526.58 respectively. Douglas county has borrowed \$66,054 from the school fund and \$19,321.19 from the rural credits fund.

Multnomah county has borrowed \$116,724 and \$4793.91 from the two funds.

S. Santo Gets Off Easy; Is Fined \$25

S. Santo, Pelican City wine manufacturer, was let off easily.

Yesterday he entered a plea of guilty of possession of intoxicating liquor and was fined \$25 and costs by Justice of the Peace Kendall.

It was Santo, whose wine vat was so cleverly hidden in a wood pine, that only an inside tip revealed the hiding place to the officers.

Santo paid his fine and returned to his home in Pelican City.

Tornado Hits Near Liberty

Salem Fruit Grower Suffers Loss By Storm

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 12.—The roof and ventilator were torn from a fruit dryer belonging to Ed Dencor, a farmer, trees in several orchards and in timber tracts were uprooted and large branches from the trees blown half a mile or more, by the first tornado that ever struck in this part of the countr, yesterday. The storm is estimated to have been 75 yards wide and it traveled in a southeasterly direction across the Liberty district about two miles south of here. The storm struck about 11 o'clock yesterday morning and was accompanied by heavy rain.
