ARMISTICE DAY PROVES QUIET

George Griffith of Salem Speaks at Laying of Cornerstone For Legion Building

Bare headed, a crowd of several hundred thronged about the new American Legion Memorial building yesterday afternoon to listen to an instructive and effective speech by George Griffith, deputy state treasurer and former state commander of the Legion, and to view the laying of the corner stone.

This speech and the cornerstone ceremony were the striking features of Armistice day in Klamath Falls. The cornerstone gave evidence of a long and tedious struggle by the American Legion to secure a building which would represent their organization in Klamath Falls and to provide a high school gymnasium. This they have done.

So far as an "alco-holiday" is concerned, Armistice day was the quietest ever experienced in Klamath Falls, according to the police. Those who did see fit to celebrate in other ways than those proscribed by law, conducted themselves with taste and discretion.

A war time picture and a dance at Altamont and Scandinavian hall completed the Armistice day program.
