Many Trappers Seek Licenses More Than a Thousand Requests Made Thus Far

Portland, Ore., Nov. 12. (AP)—Applications for trappers' licenses numbering 1,052 have been received by the game commission and they are still coming in at the rate of about 80 a day. Of these 984 are for general licenses and 108 for special beaver licenses. The right to trap beaver is not included in general licenses.

The general trapping season opened November 1 and will close on February 28. Beaver may be trapped during December, January and February.

Each license costs \$2. Territory open to beaver trapping includes Crook, Deschutes, Jefferson, Klamath, Lake, Tillamook, Washington, Benton, Multnomah, Yamhill, Clackamas, Lincoln, Polk, Marion, Linn and Lane counties, the part of Douglas county west of a line drawn north and south through Scottsburg, and the parts of Clatsop and Columbia counties between the Portland-Astoria highway and the Columbia river.

Another extensive poultry farm will be established in Klamath, the third one of large size to be started here during the past two years, with the announcement today that construction would start soon on poultry buildings on the D. E. Alexander ranch on Rock Creek, northwest of Klamath Falls.

Mr. Alexander anticipates developing a poultry ranch second to none in equipment in the county. He is the owner of one of the finest pieces of land in the county, in his Rock Creek ranch, and conditions are believed to be ideal there for poultry.

Mr. Alexander has already an order for 1000 Rhode Island Red chicks that he will care for during the winter. The shipment is expected to arrive soon.
