

## TAKE PHARAOH'S MUMMY OUT OF COFFIN OF GOLD

King Tut-Ankh-Amen was only 15 Years of age When he Died

### DESCRIPTION IS GIVEN

### Egyptologists Reveal State of Find Taken From Valley of the Kings

NEW YORK, Nov. 14.—(AP)—That king Tut-Ankh-Amen who died in Egypt some 3,000 years ago, was only fifteen years old when his body was laid in his tomb in the valley of the kings, has been definitely ascertained by the Egyptologists.

The age of the dead pharaoh had been the basis for much speculation among those who uncovered the tomb near Luxor, Howard Carter, who was the chief assistant to the late Earl of Carnarvon in the work of excavating the tomb, had believed the youth was 18 years of age when he passed away.

Age Established  
When, however, the mummy was taken from its golden-shaped coffin and the wrappings about it were removed until the golden sheathed body came into view, the experts after an examination established the age.

On the head of Tut-Ankh-Amen was a tall crown of gold. The hands were clasped across the breast. On the side of the body were strapped two gold hilted swords and two knives, the handles of which also were gold. On the breast golden stars were placed to mark the heart and lungs.

Married Young  
Tut-Ankh-Amen inherited the throne of Khun Aten through his marriage to that king's third daughter, Ank-Nes-Pa-Aten, afterward Ank-Nes-Amen, two years after her royal father had passed away. This was during the reign of the pharaoh, Saa-Nekht, his brother-in-law. Saa-Nekht is variously estimated to have reigned from eight to sixteen years after this event before his death and the succession of Tut-Ankh-Amen, the later is estimated to have reigned from two to nine years. The former figure is Howard Carter's and the latter Sir Flinders Petrie's. Sir Flinders is a noted Egyptologist.

Thus, if Tut-Ankh-Amen were fifteen years old at the time of his death he would have been only five years old when he married on the basis of the lower figure, while the larger figure would seem to be wide of the mark.

Unique Find  
On the female side, it was different, some of the princesses marrying when only one year old to require right to royalty. In Egypt royal descent passed through the daughters.

The finding of the high gold crown on the head of Tut-Ankh-Amen is a discovery unique in archaeology, as also was the discovery of the swords and parts of the royal regalia, for desperadoes and thieves usually ransacked royal tombs so thoroughly that generally the mummy was stripped to its wrappings.

### IDENTIFY DEAD MAN

Body Found in Box Car in Idaho Believed to be Baker Lumber Worker

BAKER, Ore., Nov. 14.—(AP)—Partial identification of the man found dead in a box car in Idaho a few days ago, as Chester L. Josephson, a former lumber worker of Baker was made here last night by Sheriff McKinney.

The body of the man found in Idaho was in a car from Baker, and marks on the clothing indicated the man was from this place. The skull had been caved in by a blunt instrument.

### Farmer Convicted Of Manslaughter

McMINNVILLE, Ore., Nov. 14.—(AP)—J. S. Trent, farmer, was convicted last night of manslaughter by the jury before which he was tried on the charge of killing George Hamlin, of Portland. Trent's defense was that he fired when he supposed his melon patch was being raided.

### Addicts Of Alcohol Are Now Working

Plain white bread, however fresh, and Klamath water, however pure and cold, is no diet for any man, even if he is a jailbird and canned heat addict.

So three human wrecks, in the city jail broken and weak from the assault of pure alcohol on their systems, have decided to work.

They had been served notice by the police that unless they worked at odd jobs about the city hall, they would be placed on a bread and water ration. The three canned heaters chose the bread and water, but after several meals changed their minds.

Yesterday the trio were busy mopping the police offices and sweeping out dirty corners. One was a lantern jawed elderly man, with a fatalistic grin spread over his countenance. His hands were roughened from the toil of a laboring man and his face sagged with the lines of fiery liquor were more apparent. A third was a merry soul, a young chap with a cherubic word and ready hand with a mop.

They are in jail for ten days a piece in lieu of their fines of \$20. By forcing the canned heaters to work, the police department hope to discourage them in their drinking propensities.

### Blazer To Ask Another Trial

### Colorado Physician Wants to be Acquitted

DENVER, Colo., Nov. 14.—(AP)—Lewis D. Mowry, chief of defense counsel for Dr. Harold Elmer Blazer aged physician who was tried recently at Littleton, Colo., on a charge of murdering his 34 year-old invalid daughter, announced today that he will move at once to bring about another trial of Dr. Blazer.

His intention, he declared today is to have Dr. Blazer acquitted by directed verdict in order that Dr. Blazer will have security under the law which provides he may not be brought to trial when he has been acquitted of a crime.

### Suicide Note Thought Hoax

CHICAGO, Nov. 14.—A woman may have placed the two coats and suicide note on the Michigan boulevard bridge that led yesterday to a search in the Chicago river for the body of Martin J. Durkin, auto thief and police slayer. The skeptical police, who abandoned the hunt for the body, were further convinced the affair was a hoax when Charles Mason, a chauffeur, said he saw a woman unwrap two coats and drop them on the stairs leading from the bridge to the river. Handwriting experts said the note was not written by Durkin.

### EX-CONGRESSMAN KILLED IN CRASH

MARSHFIELD, Ore., Nov. 14.—(AP)—George A. Loud, former representative in congress from Michigan, now a lumber man of Myrtle Point, was killed last night when an automobile driven by J. A. Whitaker of the Western Lumber company struck a disabled truck on the highway at Millington, two miles from Marshfield.

Whitaker was injured, but physicians said he would recover.

### STARS ARE CONSULTED

MEDFORD, Ore., Nov. 14.—A thirty-year search for his "perfect soul mate" ended on the banks of Rogue River near here Armistice day, when Horace McFarland, 55, Morristown, N. J., married Miss Verna Edna Coulter of Stockton, California, according to Rev. E. P. Lawrence of this city, who performed the ceremony, the only witnesses being his wife and Mrs. Verna Bell Ayres, a friend of the bride, from San Francisco.

The two principals first met over a year ago at a meeting of a Yogi philosophical circle in San Francisco, and it was a case of love at first sight. Determined to make a thorough test of the attachment, however, Mr. McFarland and his affianced visited a horoscope reader who declared they were perfect soul mates. They then consulted a numerologist, who examined their names and declared that "eleven" was the mystic and lucky number for them both.

The Mystic "11"  
This settled the matter. The happy couple, however, also consulted an astrologist, who told them to wed on the "eleventh day of the eleventh month at the eleventh hour, on the banks of a river flowing west while they faced east." The Rogue River was selected, and at 11 a. m. on the 11th of November Mr. McFarland and Miss Coulter, facing east, while the sparkling Rogue dashed west, and the sun shone from a cloudless blue sky, were made man and wife.

After attending to a few business matters on the coast, Mr. McFarland and his bride will sail for Europe to make their home, as Mr. McFarland has business which takes him to Europe often.

### Abandon Hope For Sub Crew

### British Admiralty Gives Up Men As Lost

LONDON, Nov. 14.—(AP)—"The admiralty deeply regrets that they no longer hold out any hope that the crew of the M-1 still survive."

This brief, officially announced this morning, was taken as definitely sealing the fate of the 68 officers and men entombed in the monitor submarine, which disappeared off the Devonshire coast during Thursday's maneuvers.

Although mine sweepers and other vessels have been searching the waters of the English channel almost continuously since the submarine submerged early Thursday morning during maneuvers, they have encountered no signs which would lead to hope.

### "Ma" To Give Many Pardons

AUSTIN, Texas, Nov. 14.—(AP)—A list of about one hundred pardons is expected to be granted Thanksgiving by Governor Miriam A. Ferguson. The governor's desire was to say nothing about the plans until November 26, but that the proclamation is being written and marked "Thanksgiving" has become known about the capitol.

### HIGHWAY IS CLOSED

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 14.—The state highway commission announced today that the McKenzie highway is closed to traffic, because of snow. Reports indicate a snowfall of over four feet at the summit.

### Silas Barclay On His Way To McNeil Island

Klamath Indian Draws Two and a Half Year Term

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 14.—Silas Barclay, Klamath Indian, is on his way to McNeil Island to begin 2 1/2 years sentence for transporting a stolen auto. He pleaded guilty yesterday to an auto theft and violation of the federal prohibition law. He drew a concurrent sentence of six months and a \$100 fine. Barclay is 19 years old.

In his latest escapade he was shot by Sheriff Youakim in Prineville, while attempting to escape from jail, and was in the hospital here for some time before he was able to go into court.

### Brawl Results In Man's Death

PENDLETON, Ore., Nov. 14.—(AP)—Clarence "Red" Munley, 24, Seranton, Pa., is held in the city jail on an open charge as the result of the death of Jim Kanine, 30, Indian, following a brawl here Sunday night. The two men engaged in a fight, according to police officers, and Munley is alleged to have inflicted injuries on the young Indian from which he died last night at 10:30. No particular charge has been lodged as yet against Munley.

### O. A. C. LEADING OREGON, 7 TO 6

### Farmers Make First Touchdown in Early Part of First Quarter

HAYWARD FIELD, Eugene, Nov. 14.—O. A. C. was leading Oregon, 7 to 6, at the end of the first half. The Aggies score came near the start of the game when by a series of line plunges and an exchange of punts they went over for the first touchdown.

In the second quarter Oregon came back strong and rushed the ball down the field on line plunges for their touchdown. They failed to kick goal.

EUGENE, Ore., Nov. 14.—Shortly before noon today a drizzling rain began, and early this afternoon there was every indication that rain might fall during the playing of the annual University of Oregon-Oregon Agricultural College football game here.

The city was thronged with Oregon alumni and Aggie rooters. It was estimated that 20,000 people would witness the game.

Fans starting to the field were clad in overcoats and mufflers, as the day was uncomfortably cold for those who were to sit in the bleachers for the four periods of the game.

Odds favored the Aggies, with the Oregon backers depending on the fact that this is Oregon's homecoming game as their main forte. With a damp field it was conceded that many unexpected things might happen.

### START EMBARGO

COLUMBIA, Mo., Nov. 14.—(AP)—Missouri's newly created state plant board today established a quarantine against all shipments of alfalfa hay and other alfalfa products from certain counties in Idaho, Colorado, Nevada, California, Oregon and the entire states of Wyoming and Utah.

The order stated that the alfalfa weevil was present in those states and there was great danger of the pest entering this state in alfalfa products.

### JURORS ACQUIT HYMAN HUNTLEY IN DEATH CASE

Medford Section Hand is Found Not Guilty of Murdering Gibbs

### JURY OUT 40 MINUTES

### Stabbing Affray over Defendant's Wife is Held Self Defense

MEDFORD, Ore., Nov. 14.—Hyman Huntley, 53, section crew worker, charged with the murder in first degree for the stabbing to death last September of Jesse James Gibbs, 28, a mill worker, in a quarrel over the affections of Mrs. Hattie Huntley, wife of the defendant, was acquitted by a jury in the circuit court this morning after forty minutes deliberation. Three ballots were taken by the jury, and they reported once for more instructions.

Huntley received the verdict with but little show of emotion, and thanked the jurors in a calm and quiet manner. Mrs. Huntley, the alleged cause of the tragedy, and Mrs. Cynthia Gibbs, sisters, were present when the verdict was returned. Huntley was surrounded by lifelong friends from Douglas county, after the jury reported, and indicated he plans to spend a few weeks in his former home.

The defense pleaded self defense and the case was hard fought throughout.

### Upton To Run For Governor

### Senator From Central Oregon Announces Self

BEND, Ore., Nov. 14.—Jay H. Upton, state senator from Deschutes, Crook, Klamath and Lake counties, last night announced himself as a candidate for governor on the republican primaries next May.

Reduction of automobile licenses to a place where the amount will take care of the road bonds, abolishment of the emergency board with all state departments compelled to operate on the money appropriated for them, were among the policies outlined in an informal statement issued.

### Woman Convict Given Freedom

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 14.—On recommendation by the state parole board, Governor Pierce yesterday granted a conditional pardon to Belle Goldtrip, who is serving two sentences of three years each in the state penitentiary for arson and grand larceny. She was convicted in Clatsop county and received at the prison November 8, 1924. The two sentences are concurrent.

### TWO SUITS AGAINST ATTORNEY DISMISSED

A suit for \$16.67, instituted by the Loreux Plumbing company against Frank L. Mars, local attorney, was dismissed yesterday as well as another suit against Mr. Mars instituted by J. E. Swanson for the recovery of \$250.

Swanson brought suit against Mars for \$250, an amount alleged due for office rent in the Swanson building. The \$16.67 suit is believed to be the smallest suit in point of money, ever brought in circuit court.

### Eggs Used For Money In Armenia

ERIVAN, Armenia, Nov. 14.—(A.P.)—Eggs are being used as currency in the Kara Kala district of Armenia where the American Near East Relief is operating. Twelve of the eggs are accepted on their "face value" as equivalent to one rable, or fifty cents in American currency. If any of the eggs are bad they may be returned as "illegal tender."

The new form of "currency" is made necessary owing to the difficulty of getting the regular soviet money to Kara Kala, which is buried deep in the mountains of Armenia. A pair of American shoes in Kara Kala costs 200 eggs.

### Fall Between Cars Is Fatal

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 14.—(AP)—John Quincy Adams, a druggist, died early today after he had suffered the loss of his right leg above the knee when he fell under the wheels of the rear car of a two-car St. Johns train last night. He fell in attempting to board the first car.

Mrs. Alice Cornelius, 20, was in a hospital today with a fractured skull and other serious injuries suffered when a car in which she was riding overturned at a curve while returning to the city early today from a party in a roadhouse. Robert A. Weaver, driver of the car, was arrested charged with reckless driving.

### Fugitive Convict Taken at Roseburg

ROSEBURG, Ore., Nov. 14.—Charles Whitacker, who escaped two weeks ago from the road camp at San Quentin, was arrested here this morning by Deputy Sheriff George Sewell. Whitacker had served 18 months of a five year sentence imposed for the theft of an automobile. He had been permitted to go to the road camp from which he escaped with a companion. He was recognized by the deputy sheriff from a description furnished by the San Quentin officials. Whitacker says that he was arrested as a vagrant at Ashland two days ago but was released without being recognized.

### CLOTHIER INDICTED New York Millionaire Held on Charge of Accepting Stolen Jewelry

NEW YORK, Nov. 14.—(AP)—Samuel Dorfman, millionaire clothing manufacturer, has been indicted by the grand jury for receiving stolen property in connection with alleged theft of \$1,115,000 worth of jewelry by Harry A. Cohn, sales.

### WHEAT EMBARGO ON No More Shipments Can be Made From Canadian Provinces After Today

VANCOUVER, B. C., Nov. 14.—(AP)—An embargo against shipments of wheat from the prairie provinces of Canada takes effect at midnight. This was ordered when a large amount of damp wheat had arrived here. Weather on the prairies has been extremely unfavorable for threshing.

### Young Publisher Appointed Solon

BISBARK, N. D., Nov. 14.—(AP)—Gerald E. Nye, 33 years old, publisher of the Griggs county Sentinel Courier, at Cooperstown, N. D., today was appointed by Governor Sorlie to fill the vacancy in the United States senate caused by the death of the late E. F. Ladd.

### PARIS DIVORCE SUIT FILED BY MRS. VALENTINO

Wife of Noted Screen Star Takes Steps to Make Separation Permanent

### NOT TO BE CONTESTED

### Rudy Sails for France to Accept Service and thus End Their Romance

NEW YORK, Nov. 14.—(AP)—The three months "marital vacation" of Rudolph Valentino and his wife is on the verge of becoming permanent because the stork has not visited them.

The screen star had a reservation on the Leviathan sailing today and has announced that he will go to Paris to accept a divorce petition filed there October 29 by Mrs. Valentino.

After denial by both sides, the filing of the divorce suit was revealed last night by Mrs. Richard Hudnut, Mrs. Valentino's mother, and then confirmed by Valentino.

### Home Loving Man

The cinema sheik, who came from Hollywood to New York last week, just before Mrs. Valentino's return from Europe, but didn't meet her at the pier, and apparently has not talked with her or seen her, says he is a home loving man and they disagreed because his wife prefers dogs to babies.

As to the next time he marries: "I will choose to have a wife whose tastes are thoroughly domestic and who is inclined to have children."

"I have been informed that Mrs. Valentino has made application in Paris for a divorce on the technical grounds permitted under the laws of France after having established a residence there," Valentino said last night.

"It is my intention to defer to her wishes in this matter."

"Our divorce will be a complete divorce."

This statement came from Rudy 24 hours after he had characterized divorce reports as absurd.

### Prefers Career

When Mrs. Valentino came from Paris last week and heard of her husband's views as to dogs and babies she said that she had no intention of giving up her career and anyway, her husband had more dogs than she.

Valentino's first wife was Jean Acker, from whom he was divorced in 1922. He married Winifred Hudnut, step-daughter of a cosmetic manufacturer, in May, 1922, in Mexico. Shortly thereafter he was arrested on a charge of bigamy because his California divorce had not become absolute under the laws of that state. He was released on his promise not to live with his bride until the divorce became effective. When it did, he remarried Miss Hudnut, known professionally as Natacha Rambova.

### Suspend Students For Belonging to Secret Societies

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 14.—(AP)—Seven students of the Grant high school here have been suspended for belonging to fraternities, and principals of other schools are investigating reports that students of their schools are members of secret societies. A state law forbids public school pupils belonging to fraternities.
