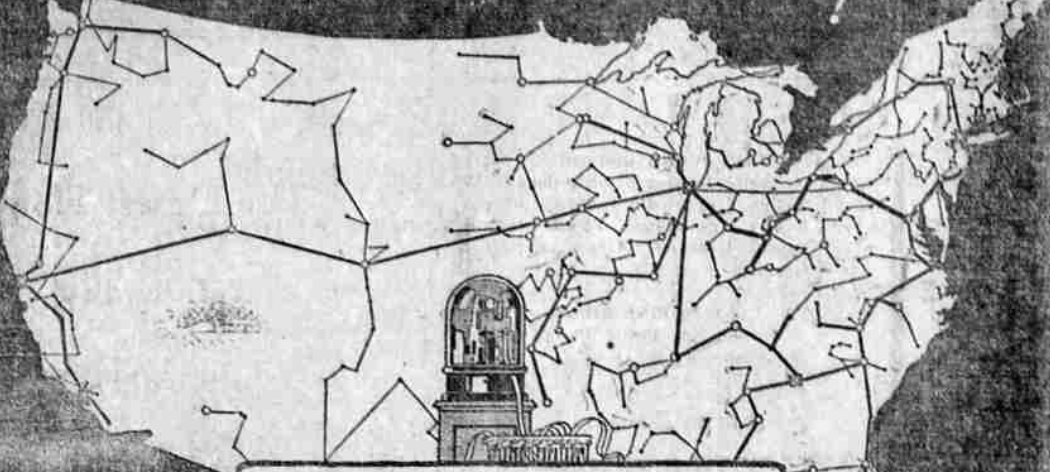

Freight Revision Under Discussion
SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 16.—(AP)—Proposed revision of western freight rates is under discussion here today by some 400 representatives of shippers and carriers at an adjourned meeting of the I. C. C. W. H. Wagner, examiner for the commission is presiding.
Chief among the problems to be threshed out are whether \$4 western railroads are entitled to a five per cent increase in freight rates, as requested in an application pending before the commission; whether rates should be reduced on livestock and agricultural products, as petitioned by shippers; whether east-bound rates on California deciduous fruits should be reduced and what general readjustment of freight rates may be made with fairness to shippers, carriers and the public.

Two Kelo Bear Hunters Missing in Snow Storm Since Saturday
LONGVIEW, Wash., Nov. 16.—(AP)—Fears are felt for Al Gordon and Ralph Burchett, both of Kelo, who have been missing since Saturday and are believed to be lost in a snow storm on the upper Cowee-man river, where the pair had gone on a bear hunt.
Gordon and Burchett left the ranger station early Saturday morning. They had expected to return to Kelo Saturday night. Only lightly clothed and provisioned with a few sandwiches, their predicament may be serious as a heavy snow is reported falling on the headwaters of the Cowee-man, a wild and very sparsely settled mountainous region. The men are believed to be in the big dam region 30 miles east of Kelo where a searching party is now conducting a hunt for them.
Gordon recently was convicted on one charge of embezzling Kelo city water department funds and a jury in a similar case disagreed and was discharged.

Jury Recommends Investigation of 2 Klamath Courts
A searching investigation into the costs assessed by two Klamath magistrates, Justice of the Peace R. C. Spink of Chiloquin and Justice of the Peace J. O. Hamaker of Bonanza, will be made by the district attorney's office as the result of the report of the Klamath grand jury which adjourned late Saturday afternoon.
The investigative body recommended that the district attorney's office ascertain whether or not certain alleged discrepancies in cost assessments had been made by the two magistrates and that if so, steps should be taken to recover money due the state.
In addition, the jury returned one true bill against Ed Wilkins charged with passing a bad check, and five secret indictments. No arrests on the secret indictments had been made up to this noon.
