(AP) - Bertha Krupp, principal owner of the great Krupp steel works, suffered a broken collarbone and injuries about the ribs today when the automobile in which she was driving with her husband, Baron Krupp von Bohlen, skidded and went into a ditch. The chauffeur was killed. Baron Krupp von Bohlen escaped with slight injuries. Bertha Krupp inherited the great Krupp works and other property estimated to aggregate \$150,000,000 upon the death of her father in November 1902. Bertha Krupp is 29 years old.

Revenue Bill Hits Low Mark

WASHINGTON, Nov. 16. (AP) - Chairman Green of the house ways and means committee believes the federal revenue for next year has been sliced to the limit of sound policy in the reductions already voted by the committee in the new revenue bill and indicates he will oppose any attempt in the house to increase the tax cut. In a statement issued as the committee prepares to complete the drafting of the bill, Chairman Green announced that the book was closed there to any further pleas for tax relief. The treasury, he said, could not stand any reduction beyond the \$204,000,000 estimated under the revisions already approved.

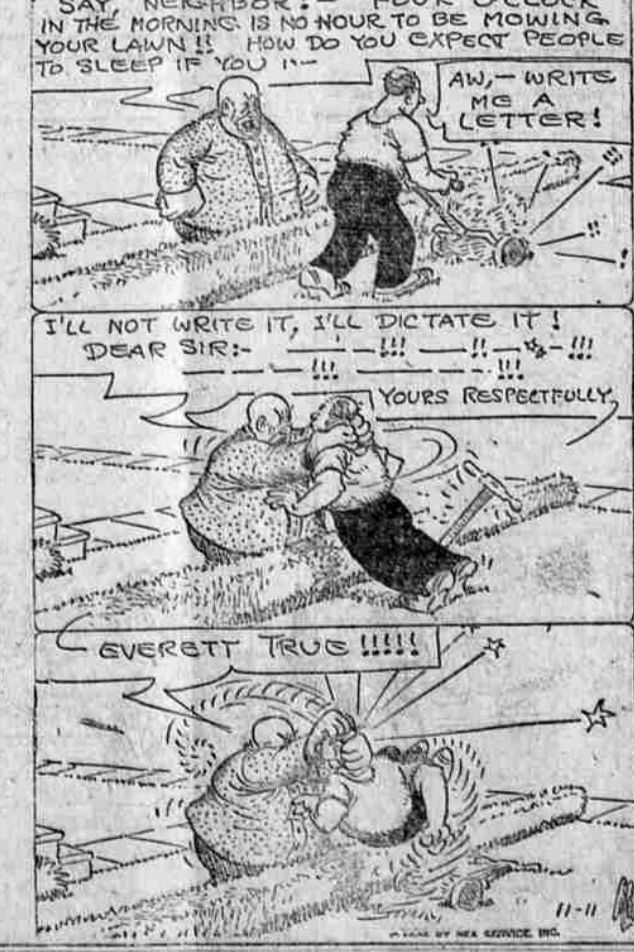
