

R. M. HOTALING DIES IN SOUTH

Former Resident of this city Dies at His San Francisco Estate

The following announcement of the death of Richard M. Hotaling, which occurred at the home of the manager of the Hotaling estate, in San Francisco, last Saturday, is taken from the San Francisco Examiner:

Richard M. Hotaling, one of the most picturesque figures San Francisco has ever known, is dead.

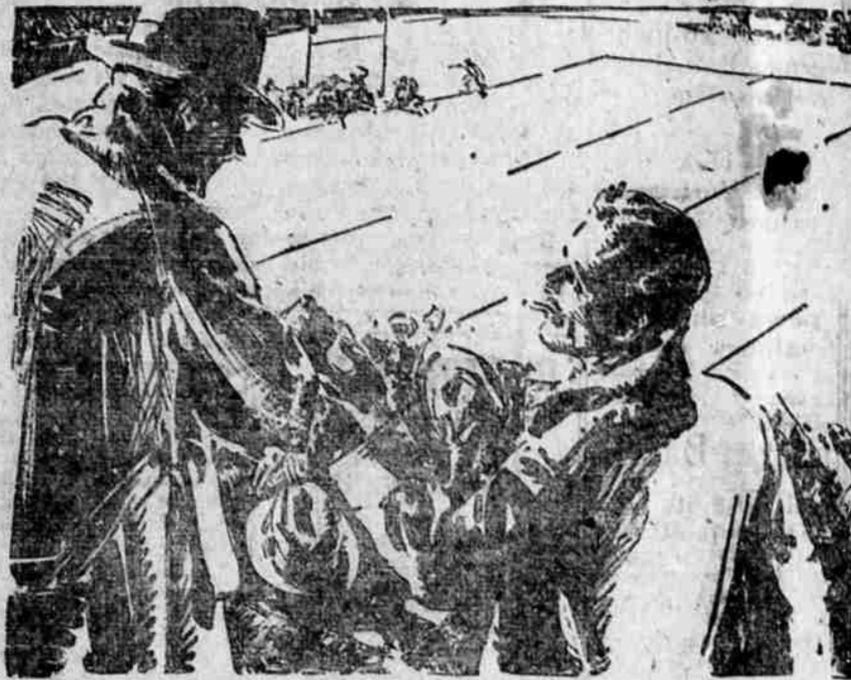
In a quiet room at the Lombard street home of William H. Sayers, manager of the Hotaling estate, the colorful career that made Richard Hotaling "front page copy" for the San Francisco newspapers for more than two decades, came to an end a few minutes before noon Saturday.

No blood kin stood by the deathbed. Only three persons were there, his sister-in-law, Mrs. A. P. Hotaling, Jr.; his physician, Dr. Guido Caplieri, and Sayers. Death was not unexpected. The bitter battle Hotaling had waged for days against pneumonia had sapped his strength beyond the limit.

Death came shortly after the termination of seven years of litigation over the \$5,000,000 estate of his father—litigation in which Richard and his sister-in-law on one side were arrayed against his mother, Mrs. Lavinia Hotaling, and his brother, Fred, and Fred's wife. None of these came to his bedside and so, almost alone, Richard Hotaling passed.

Funeral services were held at the home of Mrs. A. P. Hotaling, 1901 Franklin street. Cremation followed in accordance with the wish of Mr. Hotaling.

Into the adult years of his nearly threescore, he had crowded a wealth of activities and experiences than ran an interesting gamut—society actor, even professional player; clubman; capitalist; bon vivant; then principal figure in the sensational Hotaling family litigation that filled columns on columns of newspaper space with amazing details; and only this year his name was

The deceased has many business and personal friends in this city who will be surprised to learn of his death. About thirteen years ago Mr. Hotaling became interested in affairs in Klamath Falls, having been the financial angel of The Northwestern, one of the numerous dailies that have been launched upon the newspaper sea of this city for the purpose of eclipsing The Evening

Herald. It is said that over \$70,000 of his funds were sunk in this venture. All that now remains of this enterprise is the building at the corner of Pine and Esplanade, now used as a garage. He also owned the half of block 12, Original Town, located between Pine and High street, facing on Eighth.

FUGITIVE TAKEN BY OFFICERS ON SECRET WARRANT

Walter Jacobson, Under 2 Separate Indictments, is Captured

WAS HIDING IN ATTIC

Man Accused of Larceny and Bad Checks Located on Midland Road

A 35-day search for Walter Jacobson ended this morning in the dusty and dark garret of Mike Daly's home near Midland, where Jacobson was found in hiding.

He was arrested by Special State Agent Cole, Federal Agent McCredie and a deputy sheriff, who, acting on a tip, tracked Jacobson to his lair. Jacobson is wanted by authorities on the charge of entering the home of E. W. Reinking in Chillicothe September 30 and stealing checks and money and also on a charge of uttering a bad check on the First National bank the same day.

Spectacular Robbery—The robbery of Reinking's home was one of the most spectacular crimes ever undertaken in Chillicothe. Two men entered the house and rifled the drawers of cash and checks. When they had ransacked the rooms they calmly set fire to the dwelling and made their departure.

Waitress Sees Suspects—Reinking, at the time, was busy in his restaurant next door to his home. Aided by employes he extinguished the fire before serious damage had been incurred. A waitress working for him said she had recognized Jacobson as one of the men coming out of the Reinking home, a few minutes before the fire started.

Jacobson is lodged in jail and will await his trial which will be held the latter part of this month or the first part of next. How Jacobson came to be hidden in Daly's garret could not be ascertained by authorities. He was non-committal when he was arrested.
