HAMMOND'S PLEA BRINGS RESULTS FROM ALDERMEN

Ordinance forbidding Blasting Without Permit Passed by City Council

"Why should I be the fall guy?" "No reason why you should and we'll see that you aren't," was the indirect response of the city council last night to R. I. Hammond, when he passed an ordinance necessitating a permit from the city council before any blasting may be done in the city limits.

Mr. Hammond is the owner of an apartment house near Main and Center. A few days ago a heavy blast at the intersection of Main and Center shook his apartment house so forcibly that glass was broken, to the hazard of the inmates.

"If such indiscriminate blasting were to continue I would be run out of business," Mr. Hammond said. "If my apartment house were to be shaken many more times like it was when this blast was shot, the plaster would fall off, the foundations would be impaired and I would have to abandon the structure."

Councilman Stuckey told of how windows had been broken on Pine street, from the force of the blast. It was the opinion of Mr. Hammond and members of the council that if the blasts were shot properly, no damage would be done.

The blasting which aroused the council is the clearing away of the bluff and the corner of Main and Center. The rock is displaced by dynamite, then hauled away by the Concrete Pipe company.

Some action should be taken by the council to put a stop to duck shooting within the city limits, was the statement last night by Mayor Goddard to the council. The mayor told the council of the danger to residents adjacent to upper Link river, while there was duck shooting going on.

"I didn't know the city was so large," he remarked, "but apparently all of upper Link river and part of the Lower lake is within the boundaries and hence closed to all hunting."

"Well, I make a motion that we erect signs on upper Link river warning hunters that there is no shooting allowed and that they are within the city limits," was Councilman Balsiger's reaction to the mayor's statement.

But the council was unresponsive, taking the position that it should be discussed further.

To attend properly to the complex matters attending the approval of final plans for the new library building, a city library board should be appointed by Mayor Goddard, was the petition of 113 Klamath Falls women to the city council last night.

It was immediately agreed that a board should be appointed. The mayor deferred his appointments until next week.

Still Another Street Paving Job Under Way

Residents Petition For Paving of Main St. From Spring

Residents and property owners along Main street from Spring street east to the government canal, are congratulating themselves today, for last night they successfully consummated their first step toward the paving of Main street, a project that has long been needed but which was not possible in the past because of the low assessed valuation of the property.

A petition, requesting the council seriously to consider the project, was read, and Assistant City Engineer E. B. Henry was instructed by the council to prepare a preliminary survey and estimate of the project, in order that all preliminary steps may be completed this winter and work started first thing next spring.

Last week Dr. A. A. Soyle presented a petition asking for macadam but was told that the council favored paving. So he returned to his neighbors and last night presented the paving petition. The petition gives the first step in establishing the width of the street, which will depend largely upon the amount of money that the property can be assessed.

A committee of property holders, with W. O. Smith, ex-city councilman, as their spokesman, informed the council that a Sixth street industrial club had been formed for the purpose of aiding the council in arriving at a decision on re-paving of south Sixth street, of the construction of better sidewalks on the street, and the establishment of better lights. They asked that the mayor appoint a committee of three with whom they could confer and advise. The mayor and council approved of the plan and Councilmen Balsiger, Cofer and Powell were named as the committee.

Why can't Broad street be maintained a little better during the winter, was the query of Fay Morris, local attorney. He spoke of the cuts in the street made by persons desiring connection with the sewer system and of how difficult it was to traverse the muddy street.

Dan Walters would establish a card room on the corner of East Main street and Radcliffe if the city council would allow him permission. Walters' petition was referred to the police committee for investigation.

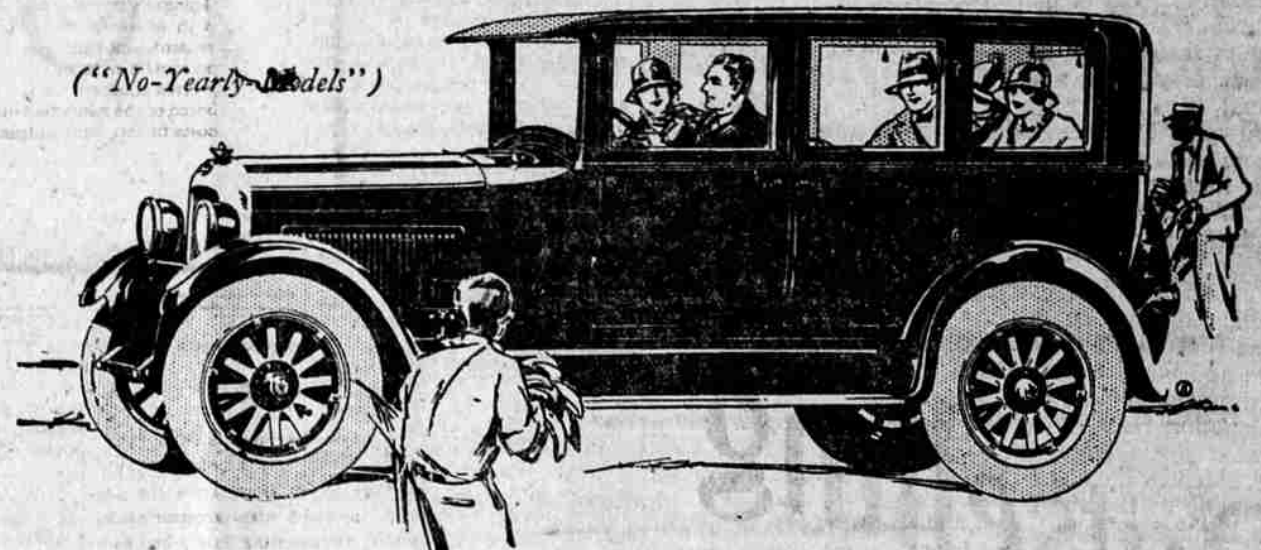

COURT OF HONOR MEET WEDNESDAY

Ceremonies To Be Held in Court House at Eight O'clock P. M.

What is considered one of the paramount features in scouting is the Court of Honor, which will convene on Wednesday evening, November 18, at the hour of eight o'clock in the circuit court, rooms at the county court house.

The Court of Honor is the organization through which Klamath Falls will show its approval of scouts who have made progress. Its primary purpose is to encourage and stimulate boys in advancement in scouting and to standardize the work of rewarding their efforts. While scouting is much more than the mere passing of tests, it has been found that boys who advance consistently from rank to rank exemplify scout principles in the best public manner. Scout progress and true scout spirit are directly connected. Heretofore the awarding of certificates and badges has been done in a more informal way and without opportunity to impress upon

the boy the importance of the occasion.

It is now proposed by the Court of Honor that the presence of well known men of the community will dignify the occasion and place the stamp of approval of the community upon the boys' work and advancement. This work will not only encourage the boy, but the Scout Master and the troop officers who have spent their days with the boy in helping him to advance. The ritual will be simple but formal.

D. V. Kuykendall will be the presiding judge and the court commissioners have been named as follows: E. L. Elliott, E. B. Hall, James Swanson, Dr. G. A. Massey, Rev. Arthur L. Rice and L. E. Banker.

The boys will appear in uniform at the American Legion hall on Wednesday evening, promptly at seven o'clock and will then go in a body to the court house for the ceremonies at eight o'clock.

Scout Executive Everett O. Nord announces that the Court will convene once every six weeks in the future, the time to be announced a week before the meeting, at Circuit Judge A. L. Leavitt's court room, at Klamath county court house, Klamath Falls, Ore.
