

VERBAL SPARKS FLASH AT CITY COUNCIL MEET

Ambrose and Lorenz Clash Over Cinder and Soot Nuisance Last Night

"There is no personal enmity on my part. But I think and have thought for a long time, that something should be done toward correction of the flying soot and cinder nuisance from the city heating plant. The way things are, it is a mess down there at the plant."

This was just one of the sparks that flashed last night from City Chief Ambrose when the 'spark arrester' ordinance was called for consideration by the city council. That ordinance was the flint and the fire chief and C. G. Lorenz of the Lorenz Plumbing company, which owns the plant, were the steel.

"Something should be done about it," the fire chief continued his talk. "The people should be protected against cinders and soot sitting in their windows, soiling their clothes and merchandise and creating a general nuisance."

G. C. Lorenz and Otto Lorenz explained to the council that it was a problem that they had not yet been able to solve, and that one spark arrester on one of the stacks apparently did not stop the emission of the sparks and cinders.

The 'spark arrester' ordinance was read for its third and last time, but after listening to the arguments pro and con, the council decided to consider it further before placing its final stamp upon the legislation. The law, in effect, forces an adequate spark arrester on all engines within

the city limits, emitting sparks and cinders.

"What I can't see about this discussion, is how it has anything to do with the elimination of the saw dust nuisance which originates at the heating plant," Councilman Powell declared.

"We'll rectify that nuisance as soon as you let us do what we want," Mr. Lorenz replied.

"And," cut in Councilman Cofer, "if you begin to go after Lorenz for the heating plant saw dust, what are you going to do about the saw dust from the mills inside the city limits?" "Well, I don't know about that, but I do know that every morning it is necessary to sweep the sidewalk off my porch, that has been blown from the heating plant sawdust pile" was Powell's parting shot.

Sells Horses That Are Not His, Complaint

Floyd Brown Sues Alex Tecumseh For \$200 Today

Councilman Powell suggested that the city purchase their own horse and saddle. This met with prompt approval from the aldermen, but after a few minutes more discussion back and forth across the council table, the matter was laid on the table with no definite action taken.

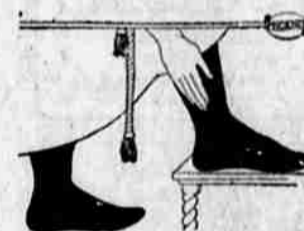
