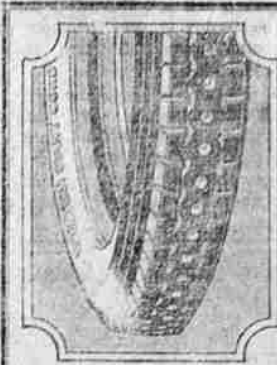
Dramatic Section of American Association of University Women Meet
