Bulgarian Princess Is Burned to Death

GROSSWARDE, Hungary, Nov. 18.—(AP)—Princess Ghika, wife of an adjutant of former King Ferdinand of Bulgaria, was burned to death while cleaning a pair of gloves. Using Benzine she stood close to a fire and the gloves ignited. With her hands and face and beautiful long hair aflame, she ran, a living torch, to her husband's room, where a blanket was thrown over her. Aid was too late, however, and she died in a few minutes after intense suffering. She was formerly the Russian princess Rowowa and was 23 years old.
