PUBLIC ANSWERS RED CROSS CALL

Mills Subscribe Heavily in Annual Drive; Booths Reap Profits

With a little less than a week left of the period set aside for the annual Red Cross roll call, Mrs. H. H. Perrin and her assistants are making every effort to put Klamath's membership over big.

The mills have been particularly generous this season, having responded whole heartedly in all instances. Pelican Bay, with \$245, leads all the rest with an incomplete canvass. Of this sum the company gave its check for \$100, the individuals employed by the company subscribed to the extent of \$121 and H. D. Mortenson presented the chapter with his personal check for \$25. According to P. A. Albertson, who is in charge of the drive in Pelican City, the logging camps are yet to be heard from.

Mrs. Matt Egan, leader for the Algoma district, is elated with her showing which surpasses last year's donations by a big margin. This little milling community gave \$107 for a cause they consider worthy—the National Red Cross.

The people living at Modoc Point and employed by Lamm's Mill gave \$57. W. E. Lamm gave his personal check for \$25 and the company gave its check for \$20, as previously reported.

There are two milling communities to be heard from this week, but it is a foregone conclusion that they will do their share in accordance with their previous records. The sum of \$360 taken in at the booths on Main street last Saturday combined with the returns from the mills and those turned in by women who are canvassing the city as well as districts to be heard from in the outlying corners of the county, will easily put Klamath county over the top.

Merrill, under the direction of Mrs. Fred Stukel has written in for 50 more memberships, having exhausted their first supply. Mrs. W. W. McNeely turned in \$30 this morning and expects to have \$40 from the Third street district by the end of the week.

Mrs. Bert C. Thomas collected \$20, and Mrs. Oscar Shive proudly exhibited membership receipts from 98 per cent of the residents of the Ninth street section. This donation amounted to \$52. Hot Springs is another completed district with a showing of \$35, under the leadership of Mrs. George A. Merryman.

Perhaps the best record of all is that of the Klamath Agency, where Mrs. Orville Elliott solicited \$59, which amount exactly doubles that taken in there last year during the drive.

"A boy joins the scouts, becomes a tenderfoot, then by passing various tests and passed on by the court of honor, becomes a second class scout, entitled to try for merit badges, he becomes a star scout, five more entitled him to the rank of life scout, and a total of twenty five entitled him to become an eagle scout, the highest rank in scouting. And it is the court of honor, composed of leading business men and professional men in the community that passes on a scout before he can advance from one rank to another.

The first court of honor held in this city on Wednesday evening, advanced the following scouts in rank: Thomas Massey, George Massey, Robert Morrison, Chester Himaker, Hubert Totten, Elmer Wilkerson, Robert Hunter and Merle Swanson.
