FARMERS DEMAND RIGHT TO WATER

BEND, Ore., Nov. 20.—The Tumalo irrigation district notified the city of Bend yesterday that any attempt of the city to divert the water of Tumalo creek under the provisions of chapter 53 laws of 1925, would be opposed by the district because the waters have been adjudicated and are now appurtenant to the lands within the boundaries of the Deschutes county municipal improvement district commonly known as the Tumalo project.

The bids for a pipe line to Tumalo creek are to be opened tonight by the city council, against which a temporary injunction was issued this week prohibiting it from delivering \$600,000 worth of bonds recently sold to a Portland bond house.

Police Catch Young Bandit

Ruse Employed to Nab Portland Highwayman

PORTLAND, Nov. 20.—(P)—After a spectacular chase in the course of which two policemen were forced to hold up their hands, two other officers today captured a youth who confessed to two Portland daylight hold-ups, one of which was committed this morning.

The chase began when Forest Bradley, employe of an auto company, recognized on the street a machine stolen yesterday from the company. He gave chase through the downtown streets and the fugitive finally escaped after threatening Bradley and two policemen with a revolver.

The youth was caught later by two officers in another part of the downtown district when he was recognized while afoot. Patrolman Barker employed a ruse to catch him.

As Barker and Patrolman Gates passed the suspect Barker remarked: "That's not the guy." Immediately after passing him Barker and Gates thrust their revolvers into his side, and he surrendered. The police said he confessed the two holdups.

Y., Nov. 20.—(P)—The Rhineland annulment trial, scheduled for resumption this morning, was adjourned until Monday to give counsel for Leonard Kip Rhineland, the plaintiff, opportunity to make necessary investigations into the contents of one of the "mystery letters" that caused sudden adjournment of the case yesterday.

RANCHERS FIGHT AGAINST HIGHER FREIGHT TARIFF

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 20.—(P)—The romantic cowboy of yesterday must now toil for \$50 a month and keep, while the lowly sheep herder commands wages of \$90 to \$100 a month. Such was the testimony today in the hearing before the Interstate Commerce Commission on general freight increases. Vernon Metcalf, secretary of the Nevada livestock growers association, said that stock and agricultural conditions of Nevada were unsatisfactory and producers were not able to meet higher freight rates. While the sheep business was improving somewhat cattlemen were making small profits or none at all. R. L. Vance and John J. McGinnis of Los Angeles, officials of two big Portland cement plants in southern California, asserted that their business needed a blanket rate to place all plants in their region on a par.

LIBRARY BOARD MEMBERS NAMED

New Commission to Relieve Council of Detail Work; to Settle Differences

Another board or commission, to lighten the responsibility and toll of the city council, came into being last night at an adjourned meeting of the city council with the appointment by Mayor Fred Goddard of a library board, composed of five members.

The following appointees were named by the city's executive: John G. Belmont, one year term; E. M. Bubb, two years; Mrs. J. F. Goeller, three years; and Mrs. A. M. Worden and Mrs. Jack Kimball, each a four year term.

This newly created board will convene in the near future and attempt to come to some agreement on the plans for the city library, over which there has been some disagreement.

But that which took up most of the time at the council meeting was the reading of seven ordinances in connection with paving projects that were started and are now nearly finished.

Louis J. Taber, national master, presented a resolution demanding that congress consider the passing of an occupational tax on all aliens desiring to enter business in the United States and who have a reasonable time to become naturalized.

Taber declared that a tax, not to exceed \$500 a year, should be levied on the alien who is taking money out of the country in which he refuses to become a citizen.
