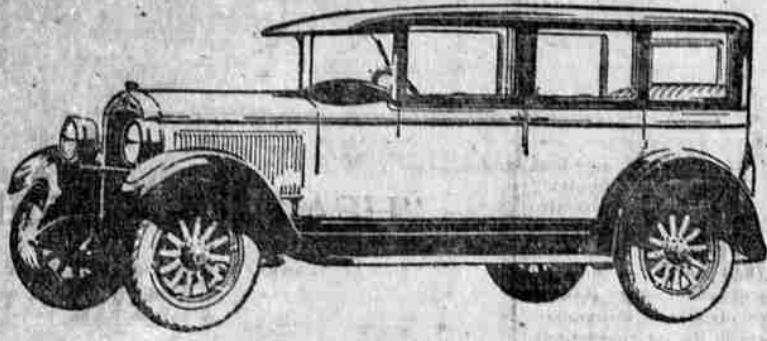

## Bear Hunting Declared Good

YREKA, Calif., Nov. 21.—Bear hunting in Siskiyou promises to be a principal attraction for sportsmen during the winter season and, while the season opened October 15, it has only fairly started for the condition of the animals is improving as the season advances into winter weather.

Never before, according to veteran hunters, have the animals been in better condition. They are fat and their pelts are already heavy. In the Salmon, Marble and Scott mountain regions, there has been an excellent crop of acorns. This crop put the animals in good condition and they are coming to the lower levels where ranchers' yards have already been visited by hungry bruisers.

Gus Kleaver of the Kleaver camp in the Scott river canyon reported the best shooting of the season so far to his brother, Dr. George C. Kleaver of Yreka. The parties that have hunted in the mountains a few days have brought out six bears, four of which dressed 650 pounds each. One measured 12 feet from tip to tip.

Both brown and black bears are being shot, the Kleaver parties getting one massive brown bear.

Gordon Jacobs of Hornbrook recently got two brown bears in the Horse creek country.

Several of the outing reports report widespread inquiry from sportsmen throughout the country and the season promises to be active till its close, March 1.

### HENLY SCHOOL

Last week the question of borrowing and loaning farm machinery came up for discussion in the Commercial Law class, and it was decided that the present system was unsatisfactory, first, because there are cases where the machinery is abused and possibly returned with some parts broken which the owner must replace before he can use it.

Second, because there are borrowers who forget to return the article at all and some times return it without the lender's knowledge. Then when the owner wants to use his ditcher, plow or wagon, he may have to spend half a day or more trying to locate it. Cases were cited where the borrower had gone so far as to claim the article's because he had forgotten how he came in possession of it.

The discussion lasted for several class periods and before it came to a close it was agreed that in the future farm machinery should not be borrowed but rented on the following basis:

Potato digger, \$2.25 per day; potato planter, \$1.25 per day; Cultivator, 75c per day; Fresno, 50c per day; manure spreader, \$1.75; binder \$5.00; mower, \$2.00; ditcher, 75c; hay rake, 75c; grain drill \$1.55 and derrick \$1.00 per day.

The rate given above shall be in effect until the article is returned and the renter shall be responsible for all damage due to his negligence.

They recommended that Jackson's case be investigated at the next meeting of the Klamath county grand jury. Miss Lawver, aged 19, was killed instantly when Jackson's car overturned. According to the statements of some officers who were present at the accident a short time after, Jackson had been drinking.

## ELECT BRADBURY VICE - PRESIDENT OF WATER BODY

### President of Irrigation District is Representative for Oregon

R. E. Bradbury, president of the Klamath Irrigation district, was elected vice president of the Western Waters Association yesterday in San Francisco, according to a wire received here today. By his election, Mr. Bradbury will be the sole Oregon representative of the association. J. C. Garrison of Modesto, Calif., was chosen president.

At the meeting of the association, it was decided to change its name from the Western Conservation and Development League to the Western Waters Association. Mr. Bradbury was nominated and elected at the meeting, despite his absence.

The purpose of the organization is clearly defined in the following excerpt from a letter received by Mr. Bradbury from the secretary:

"The heritage of this and coming generations is at stake. The control of our western waters for agriculture will mean industrial independence and prosperity for all peoples—upon the other hand, if for hydro-electric power by private corporations, we will have industrial slavery and national decadence."

In other words, it is the purpose of the organization to promote the use of water power on irrigation districts by the farmers, instead of turning this water power over to corporations for exploitation.

## Farmers Approve New Bond Issue

YREKA, Calif., Nov. 21.—By a record vote of 231 to eight, voters in the Montague Irrigation District put their stamp of approval on the \$1,395,000 bond issue at a special election and the early completion of the huge irrigation district seems assured.

As the result of the passing of the measure, bids will be advertised for \$1,000,000 of the total issue and the bids will be closed November 18.

The voting continued steadily throughout the day and when the votes were checked, it was found that only three illegal ballots had been cast. These were written in pencil, which violated the rules of the election. The discarding of the ballots reduced the prospective majority by three votes for all were in favor of the bond issue.

While the original plans for the project called for the expenditure of \$1,395,000, subsequent surveys indicated that the project could be completed at a cost of approximately \$1,000,000 and it was determined to hold the surplus in abeyance.

No official statement has been made yet concerning the sale of the bonds but it is known that several large bond houses have compiled tentative figures and several exceptionally advantageous bids are anticipated.

The overwhelming vote of Monday brings to a close all question as to the ultimate construction of the project. Work has been progressing steadily by small crews of establishing the dam sites and laying out the prospective routing of the main ditch and the principal laterals.

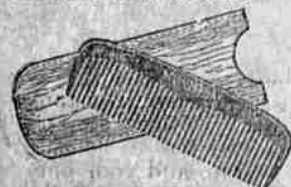
