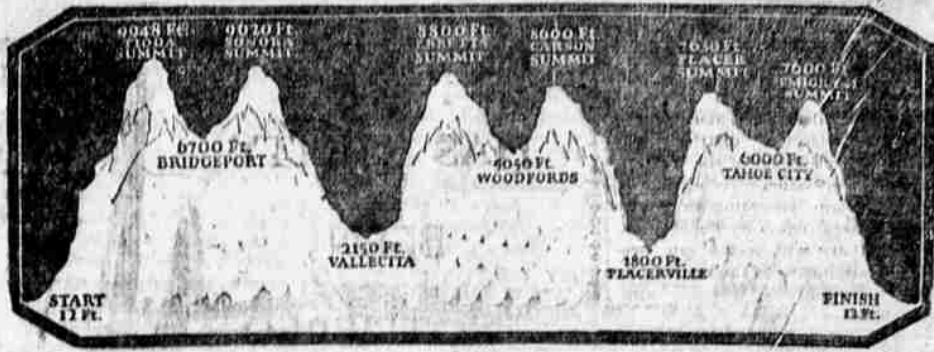

### Many Coyotes Being Killed

YREKA, Calif., Nov. 21.—When the \$5 bounty on coyotes became effective November 6, ranchers turned their attention toward eradicating the pest from Siskiyou and scalp are beginning to arrive at the office of W. J. Nellan, county clerk.

What havoc the animals are doing in the county is indicated by a coyote's attack on the chicken house owned by Mrs. H. W. Mitchell at Mt. Dome last week, where, before the animal had been killed by a ranch hand's well aimed shot, it had slaughtered 33 chickens and six turkey's, scattering the chickens over the yards.

The bounty has not been in effect for several years and during this period, the animals are said to have greatly increased in number. Klamath county has been trying to exterminate the pest through state and federal control but the Oregon authorities frequently declared that the coyotes used Siskiyou as a breeding ground and then raided the Oregon side of the line. This situation will be eliminated, it is said, by the county system.

Coyotes are said to be particularly troublesome in Shasta valley and one rancher near Big Springs recently declared that his nightly rest was being badly broken by the howling of the animals near a salt lick in the vicinity.

### Robbers Make \$75,000 Haul

**Superior, Wis., Post-Office is Heavy Loser**

SUPERIOR, Wis., Nov. 21.—(AP)—Robbers early today looted the postoffice here of nearly \$75,000 in stamps and \$125 in cash, after binding members of the family of C. J. McGill, assistant postmaster, and forcing him to yield keys and the combination to the vault.

The robbers early last night went to the McGill home, bound several members of the family, waited for others to return, seized them, and then forced from McGill the combination to the safe and keys to the building and to compartments of the safe.
