**Wine Permits  
To Be Evoked**

WASHINGTON, Nov. 23. — (AP) — Another roll of pre-prohibition days has been marked for a swift end by prohibition officials.

Some several hundred thousand wine making permits which have enjoyed a quiet and untrammelled perpetuation of life since the years before the Volstead act have come under the searchlight of the new prohibition regime and will be revoked under a regulation to be promulgated, probably within the next day or two. The permits as issued allow a maximum annual production by the holder, tax free, of two hundred gallons. They are held largely in the foreign quarters of the larger cities and are suspected of contributing heavily to the illicit supply.

Leaks of sacramental wine into illicit channels also are to be plugged up. Assistant Secretary Andrews, the treasury's prohibition field marshal, has reached an agreement with Jewish leaders, whose churches are the largest users of sacramental wine, for new regulations, expected to be issued this week, sharply reducing the amount of wine now permitted to be withdrawn for religious purposes.
