Nurse's Death Held Natural

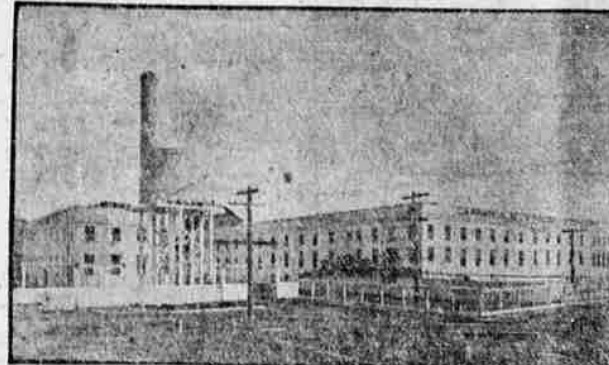
SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 23.—(P)—The death in a hospital last night of Miss Mary E. Lawrence, 25, a nurse, under circumstances which started an investigation, was caused by natural causes, it was announced here today by Dr. Shelby Strange, autopsy surgeon. Dr. Strange said a post-mortem examination showed that the young woman's death had been caused by influenza pneumonia. Investigation into her death, which occurred shortly after her arrival at the hospital, started when officials said they wanted to account for several bruises on Miss Lawrence's body and the presence in the auto in which she was brought to the hospital of an empty vial. Friends of Miss Lawrence said she had been in ill health and frequently was despondent.

Tells How Carnation Milk Is Made Last Wish Of Dead Chinaman Brings Answer

"Some people have funny ideas about where Carnation milk is produced and how it is evaporated and prepared for the market," stated J. P. Jennings of the Carnation Milk Products company, who has been in Klamath Falls this week visiting the dealers who handle it here. "Because of the world wide distribution of Carnation milk and the fact that it is one of the best known nationally advertised products, many Oregon people fail to realize that it is a home product and has a particular interest for the people of this state. The fact is, however, that every day thousands of pounds of milk from Oregon's 'contented cows' finds its way into a state wide and world wide market by way of the Carnation condensery at Hillsboro. It was the second condensery in Oregon, being erected subsequent to one at Forest Grove where the manufacture of Carnation milk in this section, according to Mr. Jennings. Washington county now has a bovine population of more than 21,000 milk cows and is noted for its extensive dairy production. Not only are high grade cows employed to produce the milk for the Hillsboro plant but every operation is designed to insure the purity and high quality of the product. All cans in which the milk is carried from the farm to condensery are washed, rinsed and sterilized at the plant. As soon after milking as possible the product of the herd is cooled promptly, put in cans and taken to the plant.

Located only twenty miles from Portland in the rich dairy district of Washington county, the Hillsboro plant has played an important part in helping to develop the dairy industry in this section. The capacity of the Hillsboro plant is about 150,000 pounds of milk per day. To be buried beneath the soil of his ancestors, that was the greatest wish of George Pan, Chinese cook in Klamath, who died here nine years ago. But for nine years, his wish had been denied. His bones rested beneath foreign soil, right here in Klamath Falls. Today his wish was answered. The Six Companies, a Chinese tong, sent two of their representatives to Klamath with instructions to arrange for disinterment of the remains of George Pan. Wong Kay, Chinese member of the tong, and resident of Yreka, arrived here this morning and secured permission to exhume the body from its resting place in Linkville cemetery. It was lifted from the grave shortly before noon and a companion of Kay's immediately scraped the bones and packed them in a sealed box. The bones will be sent to San Francisco where they will be shipped along with hundreds of others, in sealed boxes to Hong Kong, China, there to be placed in their last resting place under Chinese soil. Pan, a man of 61, had paid \$5 a year for many years to the Six Companies. He had done this primarily to insure a burial in China.



ADVENTURER SAILING AROUND THE WORLD IN THIRTY-FOOT YAWL MANILLA, Nov. 23.—(P)—Otto Karl Frits Prahl, sailing into Manila Bay, completed the first leg of a voyage which he hopes to make around the world in a 30-foot yawl. Starting from Shanghai June 7 with two companions, Prahl reached Hongkong June 23, after a rough voyage. Here his two comrades left him, but an American named Richard Lofstadt joined him and sailed across the China Sea to San Francisco, province of La Union, P. I., where he too deserted the vessel.
