Autoist Injured In Motor Smashup

Eight stitches were required to close the wound in Jack Pullin's head the result of being thrown through the windshield of his car late Saturday night, returning to Klamath Falls over the Green Springs mountain highway.

Pullin was making a turn on the mountain road, several miles west of Pinehurst Inn, when he drove too close to the edge of the road, his car striking a stump with enough force to throw him through the windshield. He was picked up by a party of motorists from Grants Pass who

took him to the Inn, where he was given first aid. In examining the wound it was found that a large piece of glass from the windshield had lodged in the wound.

Friends of Pullin from here brought him to the city for medical attention late Saturday night and he is reported to be nicely recovering from his injuries.

Pullin's car, which was badly wrecked, was brought to the city by a wrecker late Sunday afternoon.

Stanfield To Visit Klamath On Wednesday

Oregon Solon Will Speak at Chamber Forum

United States Senator Robert N. Stanfield, Oregon's junior senator, will arrive in Klamath Falls at about eleven o'clock next Wednesday morning and address the Klamath County Chamber of Commerce forum luncheon at noon. This announcement was made today by Linn W. Nesmith, chairman of the forum committee of the chamber.

Immediately following the chamber luncheon the senator will meet with the Klamath County Federal Building committee of the chamber, and return to Portland that afternoon.

L. L. Gaghagen chairman of the Federal building committee, said today that he would call the committee together for 1:30 Wednesday afternoon, in the chamber of commerce rooms.

R. H. Dunbar was booked to speak on the city manager plan but this has been postponed.

Senator Stanfield is chairman of the Senate committee on public lands and a member of the committee on claims, finance, civil service and post offices. The senator will leave for Washington, D. C., next Friday in order to be there for the opening of congress.

Jail Prisoners Checkmated in Escape Attempt

Another attempt to break out of Klamath's notoriously porous jail was frustrated Saturday evening when officers discovered improvised hack saws and other implements which would facilitate escape, carefully hidden within the jail. Investigation revealed that the prisoners had tried to dig their way through the plaster walls.

The escape was scheduled, it is believed, for Saturday night. The prisoners were to slide down an improvised knotted blanket rope, to the ground below. Peace officers suspect "Slim" Carlson and Walter Jacobsen as ring leaders in the movement to escape.

MRS. ALVERA GUBSER
With close friends in attendance, funeral services for Mrs. Alvera Gubser, wife of H. H. Gubser, government trapper, were held this afternoon at 2 o'clock at Whitlock's funeral home. After the services, the body was taken to Bonanza for interment. Mrs. Gubser succumbed in a local hospital early Saturday afternoon from septicemia.

MABLE LOWVER
The final chapter in the tragic death of Mable Lowver, 19-year-old Indian girl, was enacted yesterday afternoon, when funeral services were held at Sprague river. The body was interred in the Sprague River cemetery. Miss Lowver was killed last week in an automobile accident on the Dalles-California highway.

Work Progresses On River Bridge

Abutments and the fill on the new Harpold Dam bridge across Lost river have been completed and work will soon commence on the actual construction of the span, according to Frank Z. Howard, county road engineer.

Word from Langell valley that the temporary bridge across Lost River dam to replace the disintegrated Malone bridge, had collapsed, has brought home to the county court the necessity of completing as many of the projected spans across Lost river this fall as possible.

ELKS BACK FROM PRINEVILLE MEET

The delegation from the Klamath Falls lodge of Elks returned last night from Lakeview where they spent the week end and under special dispensation initiated a large class into the local lodge. There was a large attendance and after the ceremonies there was a banquet.

Klamath Wool Growers Hold Large Meeting

Grazing Season May be Lengthened; New Roads to be Built

If conditions justify, sheep may be allowed to graze on the Modoc National Forest land two weeks earlier than usual next year and to remain on the forest two weeks later.

Klamath sheepmen will cooperate with the U. S. Forest Service in defraying expense of construction of roads into the lambing ranges near Clear Lake and south of Clear Lake.

Estimates of expense of well digging on the Modoc National Forest will be prepared by George Lyon, supervisor of the National forest, preparatory to asking congress to make an appropriation for digging of wells.

r- PICTAPPEA ETAOIN NU
These were the salient features of the Klamath Wool Growers' association which convened Saturday night at the home of Michael P. Barry, near Merrill. It was a well attended meeting, and one of the best that the association has held since its reorganization over a year ago.

Klamath sheep men pointed out to George Lyon of Alturas that the grazing season could be lengthened by one month. Mr. Lyon admitted the possibility and promised that if conditions justified this would be done next year.

Klamath sheep men have been desirous for some time for substantial roads to allow ingress and egress to the lambing ranges near Clear lake. Interested members of the association came to an agreement with Mr. Lyon, whereby the necessary roads would be built on a 50-50 basis, the forest service defraying one half of the expense and the sheep men the other half.

Mr. Lyon informed the association that he was preparing estimates and naming tentative locations for new wells on the forest, a project which has been sought by the association for months. The costs will be given to the association which will endeavor to secure a small appropriation from congress to finance the project.

Word was received at the meeting that as a direct result of the predatory animal control meeting held here in Klamath Falls last month and sponsored by the Woolgrowers association, that Modoc county had for the first time in its history appropriated money for coyote control work. The amount was \$1000.

The association went on record as favoring the present county-state-United States Biological Service, cooperative scheme of predatory animal control work over the bounty system. It adopted a resolution expressing sympathy for H. H. Gubser, whose wife died in Klamath Falls Saturday afternoon.

Portland Team To Clash With Klamath High

Thanksgiving Game Here Will Be Played Thursday

Announcement was made this morning by Paul Jackson, principal of the Klamath County high school, that the fast high school eleven of Benson Polytechnic school of Portland, would meet the K. C. H. S. football team on the fair grounds field next Thursday afternoon, Thanksgiving day.

The game was asked by the Portland team, which, hearing of Klamath's stalwart eleven, was anxious to pit its skill against the local boys in the nation's greatest scholastic sport. The northern aggregation has agreed to come south with no financial guarantee, depending entirely upon the gate receipts to defray expenses which are estimated at over \$400.

The gridiron contest will start at exactly 1 p. m., in order that the crowd may return to their homes in good time for their Thanksgiving feasts.

The game bears particular importance because it will indicate Klamath's relative strength with other football teams in different sections. Benson was one of the fastest teams in the Portland high school league this season. It has a male student body of 1600 from which to pick a team.

Coach French is busy this week in preparing his team for their supreme effort of the football season. The same team that boasted Klamath to second place in the Southern Oregon League will meet the Benson gridiron warriors.

Three Dynamite Victims Better

One of the three injured last week from dynamite explosions had been discharged from the hospital, another is showing improvement and the third may recover the partial use of one eye, according to Klamath Valley hospital authorities today.

R. Mahan, who was badly bruised and cut from an explosion on Lincoln street, has recovered sufficiently to be taken to his home. His partner, H. Westfall, is still suffering injuries to his eyes, but serious damage to his eyesight is not anticipated by physicians.
