## MAP DEPARTMENT NEEDS NEW BOY

A map has just been issued by the United States department of agriculture and the bureau of public roads, which is labeled as the official representation of "interstate highways selected and numbered by the joint board of interstate highways, October 31, 1925." It shows Klamath lake but not Crater lake. It shows Empire, on Coos bay, but not Marshfield or North Bend. It shows Roseburg, Grants Pass and Ashland but not Medford. The Medford Mail-Tribune waxes rather indignant over it. Its indignation would seem well justified. If the excuse be that the map is designed to show interstate highway points only, the answer is that Medford is the largest southern Oregon town on an interstate highway. If it be worth while to show Empire, ghost of a village of two or three shacks and a wharf, it is worth while to show Marshfield and North Bend. If Klamath lake is entitled to a place, certainly Crater lake, which is one of the chief attractions of the Pacific coast in highway travel, ought to be included. If this is the best the government can do in map making, it ought to hire a new boy in that department—Eugene Guard.

Maud Sumter, 17 year old girl involved in a Mann act case with John L. Ford, of Marshfield, at Oakland, California, is not a Coos Bay girl but a former resident of Monmouth, Oregon. She is a distant cousin of Ford, who yesterday was sentenced to serve 18 months in the federal prison when he refused to marry the girl.—Marshfield News.

Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Conrad and their two children, Virginia and Roger, returned home yesterday evening after a two months' trip that covered fully 10,000 miles. They came home from San Francisco by motor with A. A. Dimmick, who came here on a business trip.

The Conrads crossed the continent by train to New York, visiting relatives and several Canadian points en route. From New York they visited along the east coast, traveling through the crowded and high-priced boom sections of Florida. Then they went to Havana for a short visit and came from Havana to San Francisco via the Panama canal—a bat trip through the romantic Caribbean and the tropic canal zone. ## STEWART'S WASHINGTON LETTER

WASHINGTON — It must be nice to be a diplomat in a foreign land, for diplomats, so circumstanced, can't be scolded like ordinary folk.

To be sure, there's no law exempting the diplomatic corps from the same rules that natives have to abide by, but international custom does exempt them from punishment for these rules' violation.

If a diplomat makes himself unpleasant, it's perfectly in order to ask his government to take him away but for the government of the country he's accredited to to do anything to him would be a breach of etiquette too awful even to be considered.

By the time a diplomat reaches ministerial or ambassadorial rank he's very apt to have acquired an acute sense of responsibility—to his own superiors, if not to the officials of the country where he represents them.

He knows it's essential to a good job on his part that he should be on his best behavior so he minds his P's and Q's.

But occasionally some young secretary of attaché abuses his privileges. He seldom commits a very high crime, but it's by no means unusual for him to knock the stuffing out of all speed regulations with his automobile, and prohibition has suffered a considerable number of infractions at his hands.

Only a few days ago one of Washington's young diplomatic auto scooters overdid matters to an extent which forced the police to complain to the state department. The department, in turn, tactfully suggested to the offender's embassy that it thought a spanking would do him good.

There's small doubt that he got it red-hot from his chief.

### CENSUS LARGER

That the school census of Bend this year will approximate 3,000, between 300 and 400 more than last year, is the estimate made this afternoon by Mrs. J. Alton Thompson, who is now completing the annual census.

Since the factor five is taken in making an estimate of the total population from the school census Bend's population this fall should be 15,000. This figure does not hold good in Bend, believes Mrs. Thompson.

The reason why the school population cannot be multiplied by five, or even by four, to get the total population is because of the great number of young married couples here, Mrs. Thompson explains. A surprisingly large number of married women have been found to be of school age, under 21.—Bend Bulletin.
