MITCHELL CASE IS NEARING END

Defense Winding up Testimony in Court Martial of Air Officer

WASHINGTON, Nov. 25.—(AP)—The defense in the court martial of Colonel William Mitchell began winding up its case today in a peaceful atmosphere, in marked contrast to the tenseness noticeable for the last two days when the accused officer took the stand.

Representative Reid, of Illinois, Colonel Mitchell's counsel, announced at the outset that his case would be completed before nightfall, but the activity of the prosecution in arranging rebuttal testimony indicated the end of the case was some distance away. It is considered certain that Major General Charles P. Summerall, commanding the second corps area, and former president of the court will be brought in by the prosecution.

Colonel Herbert A. White, military counsel of the defense, today resumed his reading of the voluminous official correspondence. Congressional committee air service hearings, and reports taken from the war and navy department's files regarding aviation questions generally.

Chevrolet Driven By Old Pioneer

The drama of American transportation has been enacted within the 90-year life span of Captain Joel Muley Hoback, one of the few surviving links between the romantic day of the covered wagon and the modern automobile.

Captain Hoback who formerly drove a covered wagon now is an enthusiastic motorist.

In 1845 when only 10 years old he drove four yoke of oxen as they plodded slowly westward with a creaking prairie schooner in which he and his parents migrated 150 miles to Wintlemac, Indiana, then a frontier town.

In crossing the Wabash river the eight oxen became frightened, got beyond control of the child driver and lunged away through shoulder-deep water. They nearly upset the wagon but finally returned to the east bank of the river at the battle ground near Lafayette, Indiana, where Harrison a few years before had defeated a large band of hostile Indians.

Today, 80 years later, Captain Hoback, erect, alert and with the clear eye of the frontiersman, is enjoying transportation of a far different type. After hesitating for 10 years "to tackle the new-fangled gasoline rigs," he has purchased a Chevrolet touring car.

"Goes like a scart rabbit," said Captain Hoback. "Easy to drive too. I thought a body had to be pretty good with machinery to handle a car. Mebbe that was true way back when I first started to hanker after a car—when I was only 50 years old—but it shorely isn't true now. I missed a lot of fun by waiting so long."

Captain Hoback drives frequently in the vicinity of Britton, Oklahoma where he now resides. He has built a garage for the car. The Captain rents out the large farm which he homesteaded after joining the land rush from Oklahoma City in 1889.

IRRIGATIONISTS ASKED TO WAIT

State Will not Extend Guarantee of Interest at Present Time

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 25.—The Eagle Point irrigation district of Jackson county will have to wait a little longer before the state irrigation securities commission promises to extend the guarantee of interest on its \$400,000 bonds. The commission told representatives of the district yesterday that it would do so if the cooperation of the people of Jackson county can be obtained. An extension of 1 1/2 years in the guarantee is asked, increasing the present guarantee to five years.

The commission received crop estimates from Jackson county projects showing that crop returns this year from the Modford irrigation district were \$2,500,000 and from the Talent district \$900,000. The former project was developed at a cost of \$10,000,000 and the latter at \$1,235,000.

It was declared that the Eagle Point district should make an even better showing considering the development cost.

CHINESE STAGE SERIOUS REVOLT

PEKING, Nov. 25.—(AP)—A serious revolt has occurred among the supporters of the Manchurian warlord, Marshal Chang Tso Lin, who are fighting each other at Lwan-chow and Chiwangtao, in eastern China, along the Peking-Mukden railway. The claims of the various parties, are conflicting.

Some quarters assert that General Kuo Sung-Lien, Manchurian general, has captured Mukden, the capital, and imprisoned Chang, while others assert that Chang's loyal troops have broken the railway at Chiwangtao to hinder an advance by Kuo Sung-Lien against Mukden.

Li Ching-Liang, the civil governor of Chihli, is preparing to declare himself independent of Mukden and also is reported to have drafted a telegram urging Chang to retire. It is considered certain that the Mukden party has collapsed, at least temporarily, thus strengthening the hands of Feng Yu-Ksiang, the "Christian general."

Cornell to Clash With Pennsylvania

NEW YORK, Nov. 25.—(AP)—The annual battle of Cornell and Pennsylvania at Philadelphia is tomorrow's eastern gridiron feature.

A year ago "Gloomy" Gil Doble, Cornell coach, made the pre-game statement that Pennsylvania would beat his team, and Pennsylvania did, 29 to 0.

Doble has been silent about tomorrow. His team has had a good season except for the air onslaught at Dartmouth when there were so many footballs in the air that his men were all at sea.

Pittsburgh and Penn State are primed for their annual battle at Pittsburgh. A capacity throng is expected at Pittsburgh's new stadium.

West Virginia and Washington and Jefferson clash in Morgantown. Syracuse and Columbia meet at the polo grounds, where Harlan Carr and "Shrimp" Foley will attempt to outrun the New York speedster, Captain George Peas.

Jackson Keefe, flashy half back will lead Brown against Colgate at Providence. The east's leading scorer, Captain Eddie Tryon, is expected to stage a bright individual tussle with Keefe.
