

### Many Patients Are In Arrears

YUKKA, Calif., Nov. 27. — With several thousand dollars outstanding on the books of the Siskiyou County hospital, District Attorney Charles E. Johnson is checking over the accounts with a view to bringing suit against those who have failed to liquidate their hospital bills.

Dr. Charles Plus, superintendent of the hospital, called the situation to the attention of the board of supervisors at a recent meeting and District Attorney Johnson was instructed to proceed with the suits, as soon as he has gathered sufficient data to prepare the complaints.

Several of the accounts have been outstanding for many years, while the sums involved range from a few dollars to several hundred. Nearly all the bills have been contracted by persons who are said to be solvent.

### Kendall Deals Stiff Jolt To Malin Rancher

**E. Wenzel Sent to Jail For 60 Days And Fined \$250**

Trembling hands and the appearance of the prisoner being sick, did not deter Justice of the Peace Ed Kendall from thoroughly investigating the case of E. Wenzel, alleged moonshiner, arrested Saturday by Special Agent Cole. And as a result of the investigation, Wenzel was fined \$250 and sentenced to 60 days in jail, instead of being let off at a nominal fine.

Owing to Wenzel's physical condition, Kendall was inclined toward leniency. But when a special investigator reported to him this morning that Wenzel was the leader of a moonshiners' ring in southern Klamath, he changed his mind and levied a heavy sentence when Wenzel entered a plea of guilty to possession of intoxicating liquor this morning.

H. Quade was fined \$200 and sent to jail for 30 days and Ed Stewart was fined \$125, following their pleas of guilty to possession of intoxicating liquor. The two who had been intercepted by Cole as they were carrying a 30 gallon keg of moonshine from the Wenzel ranch.

H. Mumford and E. Clemon, were rather indiscreet in the manner in which they handled their bottle of whiskey at the dance at Merrill last night. They were caught red handed, but Justice of the Peace Kendall taking into consideration their age and the small amount of liquor, fined each of them \$25.

### OLD FAITHFUL GEYSER IS STILL SHOOTING REGULARLY

### EDUCATORS MEET TO TALK DRAMA

PITTSBURGH, Nov. 27. —(P)—Educators, playwrights and other nationally known figures gathered at the Carnegie institute of technology today to confer on the drama in American universities and little theaters.

Explaining the purpose of the conference President Thomas Baker of Carnegie Tech said, "It is realized that the stage is not in a vigorous state, that the drama, as literature, receives but meager respect," and explained that "We wish to know especially what the universities are doing to create an instructed and cultivated taste and what the little theaters are doing to supply the inadequacies of the criminal theater."

The university theater would never rival the university stadium, Baker said, adding that the most renowned figure in American university life was not a man of letters, but "Red" Grange, "who turns his back contemptuously on college courses and his degree."

### SAME LOCOMOTIVE NOW PULLS FAST TRAINS LONG DISTANCES

PITTSBURGH. —(P)—Thirty-two fast passenger trains on the Pennsylvania railroad between New York and Pittsburgh, are now being operated without a change of locomotives. The road experimented with this innovation first by trying the plan on two fast passenger trains between the Smoky City and the metropolis. For thirty days the lone locomotives, making the entire haul, pulled the flyers in on time.

The plan was extended to take in two trains between Pittsburgh and Philadelphia, as well as two trains carrying mail and express between this city and Chicago. Again the big locomotives proved their endurance qualities, and the Pennsy engineers have decided to extend the no-change system to include the 32 fast trains between Pittsburgh and the East. Later, they said, it would take in the lines west of Pittsburgh.

To insure the non-change plan, the road replaced the lighter type passenger locomotives with heavier ones, thus increasing the speed on the level ground and making possible the long mountain hauls.

### SOME IRISH LABORERS IN 21 CENT-A-WEEK COTTAGES

DUBLIN. —(P)—Ireland owns more than 50,000 cottages, erected at the expense of the local authorities, to provide housing for laborers. The policy of their erection dates from as far back as 1883 when T. P. O'Connor secured enactment of a bill for that purpose by the British Parliament, and it has since been largely extended.

Rents of one of these cottages in the Cork rural district is only 21 cents a week. Complaint is made that the wrong people are now occupying the Cork cottages. They are built for poor agricultural laborers, but it was stated at a meeting of the Cork County Board of Health that their occupants now include milk vendors, railway workers, masons, carpenters, rate collectors and school teachers.

### Large Storage Shed Is Moved By Use Of Scows

TACOMA, Wash.—A storage shed 100x117 feet is being moved in 100-foot sections on scows from the plant of the Todd Shipbuilding company on the Tacoma tidewater flats to the premises of the John Dower Lumber company. F. T. Call, Tacoma, is the moving contractor.

Two scows, side by side, are required for each section. Call has built a gridiron of 10x10 timbers alongside the Todd waterfront, and between tides he moves a shed section as far as possible onto a scow which rests on the gridiron. At high tide a second scow is placed beside the first, and the section is moved over it until it straddles both scows. The fixed scow floats off and the section is towed to its new location.

### Jap Steamer Is Held For Damage In Lumber Suit

PORTLAND, Ore.—A court order attaching the Florida Maru has been obtained by the National Commercial corporation, a Washington concern, which filed suit in federal district court here for \$15,000 damages against the Kawasaki Dock Yard company, the owners and operators of the vessel. The plaintiff company charges that the defendants have refused to issue bills of lading for 370,000 feet of lumber which they have loaded. Other causes of action cited were the alleged loading of lugs against orders, the refusal to carry a capacity load and loading an excessive amount of oil, thus cutting down the possible cargo tonnage.

PRAGUE. —(P)—The complete works of Goethe are being translated by a staff of Czech translators under the direction of Prof. Otokar Fischer. The object is the publication of a Czech edition of his complete works published in a language other than German.
