Portland Team Beats Klamath

Locals Drop Turkey Day Game to Benson 39 to 6

Defeated but not disgraced.

This sums up the Benson Polytechnic-Klamath high school football game at the fair grounds yesterday when the Portlanders romped away with the game, 39 to 6. The Portland boys were too experienced and too heavy for the local lads, and crashed through the Klamath line repeatedly for substantial gains.

The Klamath boys were not able to get started during the first two periods, but with the start of the second half they showed a reversal

of form and played the Portlanders on almost even terms.

Klamath's lone touchdown came in the third period when an intercepted pass put the ball in Benson's territory. Then the local team with a series of passes and a rushing end run by Hall, put the ball over the coveted goal line for six points. They failed to convert the goal.

School officials and spectators generally were not disheartened by the defeat. This is the first season in which Klamath high has made any progress in football, and there is every prospect that the team will be a real contender next season.

The boys were given good support by their elders, the grandstand being comfortably filled with Klamath partisans.
