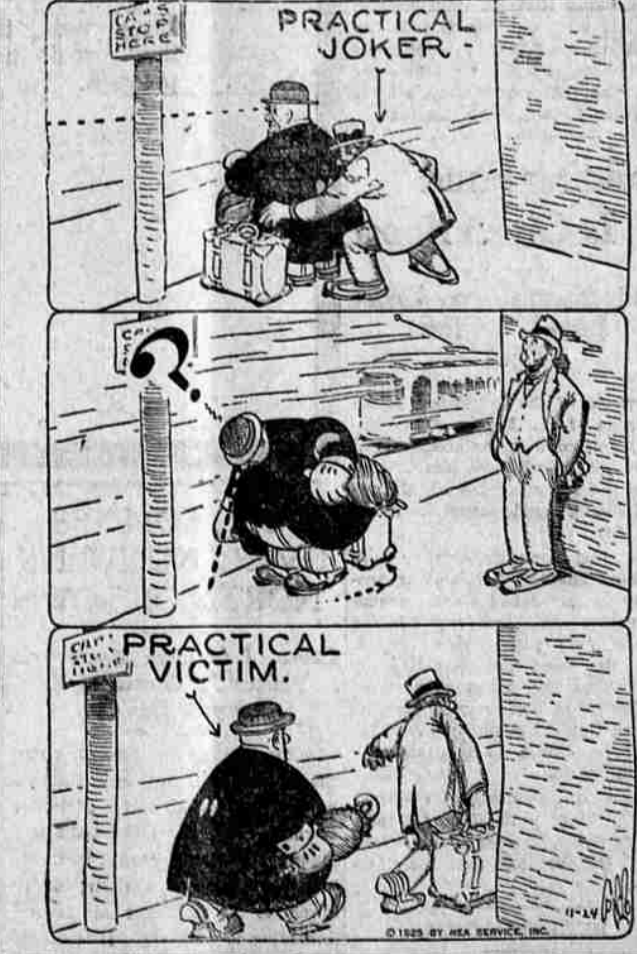

AIR MAIL TO SAVE TEN DAYS BETWEEN ENGLAND AND INDIA

LONDON.-(AP)—A weekly mail service between England and India is being undertaken by the Imperial Airways, Limited, through a subsidy and a five-year contract given by the air ministry. Mails will be delivered in Bombay in five days against the present 15 days, and when the service comes into regular operation next summer passengers also will be carried. At the outset passengers will only be carried between Cairo and Basra. The route, just under 2,600 miles in length, will be from Kantara via Ramleh and Amman to Bagdad, thence to Basra and Karachi. To prevent forced landings, especially designed three-engined aircraft will be used.

SECTIONS OF ALASKA TO BE LINKED BY AIR SERVICE

FAIRBANKS, Alaska.—With ten landing fields built or in construction in Alaska, airplane communication is promised between the interior terminus of the Alaska railroad here and most of the important mining sections and settlements in the territory. Fairbanks is to be the center of all airplane trips into the interior. Southwest of Fairbanks three fields have been established. They are at Lake Minchumina, 125 miles from this city; Taconta, 250 miles and Flat, 325 miles. The Lake Minchumina field is intended mostly for a refuge in storms which sweep across that section from Mount McKinley.

RUSSIAN ACTORS BUILD HOME

MOSCOW.—(AP)—A group of Moscow actors, including K. Stantslavsky, W. Danchenko, W. Kachalov and others belonging to the Moscow Art theater have formed a special building society for the erection in Moscow of a special home for actors and painters. Besides living quarters the new house will contain a theater and a roof-garden. Local authorities have promised to assist them in their venture.

ASK NEGRO MEMBERS OF "Y" FOR SOUTH AFRICAN HOTEL

NEW YORK.—(AP)—Construction of a hotel for native students in South Africa at a cost of \$20,000 has been made the subject of an appeal to 32,000 negro members of the American Y. M. C. A. by Max Yergan, an American negro, who pioneered in organizing associations in Bantu Land. The proposed clubhouse would be located at Fort Hare college, Alice, Cape Province. Officials of the Colored Work Department of the Y. M. C. A. National Council here expect other men to be sent soon to South Africa to aid Yergan, who in his four years there has organized almost single-handed 26 associations throughout the native wilderness and travels a circuit of 8,000 miles to keep them in operation. Yergan's request will be referred to the Conference on Colored Work, which will be held in Washington, D. C., October 21 to 32. The pioneering movement was conceived and has been supported entirely by Negroes in this country, to bring about "the spiritual, moral and social uplift" of their 5,000,000 South African brothers.
