Klamath County Will do its Part in Annual Drive Says Mrs. Bellman

Klamath county residents are showing a speedy response to the appeal of the Klamath County Public Health association in the sale of Christmas seals, according to first reports received by Mrs. G. A. Bellman, chairman of the seal sale campaign.

"Do you realize that 100,000 people die of tuberculosis in the United States each year?" inquires a statement issued today by Mrs. Bellman. "Right here in Klamath county and Klamath Falls the prevalence of tuberculosis in its incipient and developed stages is far greater than appears on the surface.

"As you are well aware, the Klamath County Public Health association, in conjunction with the national and state tuberculosis associations, has as its work the prevention and cure of this dreadful disease. Much of our work, which includes a broad public health program, is in its very nature unheralded.

"In the city and rural districts we work to correct conditions that tend to favor the development of tuberculosis. Children are encouraged to play and to take wholesome food and fresh air. In the homes of the afflicted we supply needed directions and secure treatment directed to a proper cure; and last, but not least, we frequently furnish medicines, food-stuffs and clothing to either grown persons or innocent children where the onslaughts of ill health have reduced the victims to poverty. Every dollar raised from the sale of Christmas seals goes into the fight for good health."

FORMER SUPREME JUSTICE IS DEAD

A. S. Bennett, Prominent Judge and Resident of The Dalles, Succumbs

THE DALLES, Ore., Nov. 28.—(AP)—A. S. Bennett, former justice of the state supreme court, and one time democratic candidate for governor, died at his home here this morning.

Death resulted from tubercular glands of the throat. Mr. Bennett is survived by his widow, one daughter, Mrs. Chauncey Butler of Portland, and one son, Alfred M. Bennett of The Dalles. He was prominent in legal and political circles of the state for many years.

American Auto Assn. Wars on Roadside Courts

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28. (AP)—The American auto association announced today that it would support a program of placing all main highways of the country under state road patrols and abolishing the fee system of arrests, in order to "rid motordom of its worst infestation, the speed trap and the roadside court."

Other recommendations of the program are that arrests be based on recklessness rather than "technical" speed violations and that evidence obtained by "Speed Traps" be barred by law.

Chapman Writes Brief Attacking President's Act

HARTFORD, Conn., Nov. 28. (AP)—Reprimed from the gallows for three months by Governor Trumbull, Gerald Chapman, mall bandit convicted of murdering a policeman, is acting as one of the lawyers for himself.

In a five page brief written with pen and ink in his cell and bristling with legal terminology he contends that President Coolidge has "immorally and unlawfully" employed the commutative power as an instrument of force.

The president has commuted Chapman's sentence of 25 years to Atlanta for robbing the mails in New York in order that Chapman may hang in Connecticut for killing a policeman after he had escaped from Atlanta.

Chapman's lawyers plan to go as far as the United States supreme court if necessary to prove that he first should serve his federal sentence before being executed in Connecticut.

Dyman revived Burt T. Green, a fellow employe, recently when the latter had been burned while working on a pole and had fallen to the ground.

Rebel Tribesmen Mobilizing for Attack of Enemy

BEIRUT, Syria, Nov. 28.—(AP)—

The rebel Druse tribesmen, answering fire signals from various high hills in the region of Rashaya, are flocking down the mountainside and from the villages to reinforce the hands of the leaders preparatory to further anticipated attacks by the French forces. It is the desire of the Druses to wipe out the defeat which the French recently administered to them in Balka valley and at Rashaya. The French in an official communication admit that they expect another important operation.

Around Homs, in northern Syria, bandits have struck terror in the hearts of the populace. To meet the situation there French reinforcements from Tripoli are carrying out a forced march as the railway line between Homs and Pas Baalbek to the south has been cut. The Christians at Homs are seeking asylum in the foreign mission compounds or are in flight toward the Mediterranean.

French reinforcements have arrived at Beirut.

Queen Mother Laid To Rest

Simple Service Marks Passing of King Edward's Wife

WINDSOR, England, Nov. 28.—(AP)—England's queen mother was brought home to rest among the tombs of the kings at Windsor this morning.

While London slept, Alexandra's body was taken from Westminster Abbey where the funeral services were held yesterday and conveyed by motor hearse to this, the most beautiful of all the royal castles in England.

As the procession entered the palace grounds the sun's rays flashed on the flag draped coffin and brought into strong relief the gray, snow-capped towers of the ancient home of royalty.

The casket was placed on a catafalque below the steps of the altar in St. George's chapel, where it will rest amid a profusion of flowers until a sarcophagus is prepared beside that of Alexandra's husband, Edward VII.

At 11:20 o'clock a simple private committal service was held, with the royal family present. The ancient cloister abutting the royal chapel was filled with wreaths from all parts of the world.

By noon thousands of people had already come to view the cloister and many more thousands are expected tomorrow.
