Reed College Head Defends Women Smokers

Why Distinguish Between Men and Women, He Asks

ALBANY, Ore., Nov. 28.—With but one exception, presidents of the independent colleges of Oregon in session here Friday and Saturday stated that smoking among the men and women students would not be tolerated.

The exception was Norman F. Coleman, president of Reed College of Portland, who would not agree that punishment should be meted out in the case of co-eds using tobacco.

"Why should we distinguish between men and women in the matter of smoking?" asked Prof. Coleman. "At Reed college the students make their own rules, and the use of tobacco is included. The only interference is where students under 18 years old wish to smoke. These must have written consent of parents or guardians."

President L. W. Riley of Linfield college, speaking for the college, said that "we would freely separate from our institution any students found using tobacco. And that applies to men as well as women."

Tobacco Attacked
President C. W. Greene of Albany college was just as outspoken. "Coced smokers in Albany are not a worry, for we have not one girl who uses tobacco. If we did have such a student, no time would be lost in getting her name off the class rolls. The men students are affected by this ruling just the same as the women."

Professor Perlisho of Pacific college, stated that "Pacific college does not allow smoking by either boys or girls. If a student is caught smoking, he is severely reprimanded, and if he persists in the habit, he ceases to be a student at the college. This rule, of course, was made for the men students before the problems of co-eds using tobacco was ever thought of, but it would apply to women."

"We prohibit the use of tobacco at Philomath college," said President H. Dixon Bougher. "A girl has never been known to smoke at Philomath, and we try our best to discourage the habit wherever found in the city."

Army Defeats Navy, 10 To 3

Versatile Attack of Cadets Could Not Be Stopped

NEW YORK, Nov. 28.—(AP)—The Army torpedoes the Navy's gridiron craft today and won the annual service battle, 10 to 3, before a notable crowd of 65,000 spectators.

First Quarter
The navy won the toss and kicked off to Wilson, who returned to the Army's 30 yard mark. The cadets failed in an aerial attack and were forced to punt. Hamilton punted to Wilson on the Army's 45 yard line. From there Wilson broke through left tackle on the first play and dodged his way 42 yards to Navy's 13 yard line. When three line plays were unmade, the Army called in its star drop kicker, Red Reeder, but the latter's attempt was partially blocked, the cadets recovering on Navy's eight yard line.

Second Quarter
The Navy's attack got into motion early in the second period for the first time, an eleven yard dash off tackle by Shapley and a sensational 32 yard forward pass, Shapley to Hardwick putting the ball on Army 12 yard line. Three rushes netted eight yards, then Hamilton dropped back and booted a pretty field goal from the 12 yard line and put the Navy in the lead, 3 to 0.

After successive fumbles by each team around midfield, Army opened an attack from Navy's 46 yard line, penetrating to the 16 yard line when Trappell took a 23 yard pass from Harding. Harding tossed a pass to Captain Boxer, end, who grabbed the ball and fought his way over the line for a touchdown. Wilson kicked the extra point.

Third Quarter
Captain Baxter kicked off for the Army and Hamilton ran it back 15 yards to his 28 yard line. On the first play Banks ripped through right tackle for a 24 yard gain but Army checked the next few rushes and Hamilton punted.

A fumble by Hewitt gave the Navy the ball on Army's 40 yard line after Wilson had intercepted a middle pass, but the Army stopped another aerial drive and the cadets opened up a fresh attack. Hewitt broke through center for a 15 yard gain to put the ball on Navy's 45 yard mark, but a five yard penalty for off-side play upset the cadet march.

From Navy's 45 yard line Hewitt led an Army drive that steadily pushed the middles back. Hewitt made first down on the 12 yard line. When three rushes yielded only seven yards, Reeder was called
