

Big Shipment Of Silk Due Dec. 7

SEATTLE, Nov. 30.—(AP)—A 14,000,000 shipment of silk, the largest consignment of its kind to be carried by an American oriental liner for several months is due here December 7 on the steamship President Grant. Besides the silk, the President Grant has 4,000 tons of oriental freight and 3,000 bags of mail. The vessel is carrying 250 passengers.

Manchurian Leader Stationed on Coast

PEKING, Nov. 30.—(AP)—General Kuo Jung-Lien, former supporter of Marshal Chang Tso-Lin, the Manchurian war lord, has established headquarters at Chinwangtao on the Chihli coast, while his forces have occupied Shanhaikwan, a short distance to the northeast on the Peking-Mukden railway. Chang's followers are concentrating upon Chinchowfu, 100 miles to the northeast, on the railway, and a battle is expected near Shanhaikwan.
