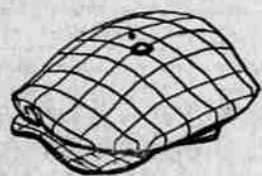

The hold-up attempt took place in the Ashland-Klamath Falls highway near the summit of Green Springs mountain.

Steers Shipped South to Market

A carload of steers from the John Liskey ranch near Merrill and another carload of fat cows from the F. P. Chorpene ranch at Olene, were shipped out of the county today, to San Francisco where the J. G. Johnston meat concern will take delivery.

Today's shipment closely follows a consignment of eight carloads of steers, owned by D. H. Barneburg of Ashland, sent to Sacramento to the C. Swanston & Son, wholesale meat dealers.

The sales were consummated by the California Cattlemen's association, under the supervision of Jack Hunt, local representative.

A. W. Schaupp Opens Up Law Office Here

A. W. Schaupp, a prominent attorney of Eastern Oregon, has recently moved to Klamath Falls and has opened up law offices in the I. O. O. F. building in the city.

Mr. Schaupp has been engaged in the practice of law in Oregon for many years, is an ex-district attorney of Wallowa county and has been active in both legal and financial circles in Eastern Oregon where he is widely and favorably known.

Mr. Schaupp is not altogether a stranger in this city. He is president of the Klamath Valley Savings and Loan Association, which was organized by himself and other business men of the city during the early part of 1925.

Alderman Scrap But License Is Denied Anyway

A smoldering fire of aggravation and argumentation that has smoked since the night that Councilmen Balsiger and Stuckey failed to put in an appearance at a meeting of the police committee, broke into flames last night at an adjourned meeting of the city council.

It was over the license of the Arcade hotel pool room and in parenthesis it might be well to state that despite all the verbal fireworks, the license for the establishment was denied.

Last week a special meeting of the police committee was called, at which the Arcade hotel license was to have been discussed. One member of the committee was present, Councilman Powell. Councilmen Balsiger and Stuckey were conspicuous by their absence.

The point at issue—the point of argument—seemed to be over the statement of Alderman Stuckey that the council in denying this license seemed to be picking on one man. Balsiger backed up Stuckey in the controversy with the statement that the police were not doing their best to clean up the town. Councilman Powell took the other side of the argument and strongly supported the police and their activities.

Seniors Win Debate From Junior Team

At the first debate of the Klamath high school yesterday the senior debaters carried away the honors over the junior debaters. The negative standpoint was supported by the seniors: Resolved, That every student in Klamath County high school should be compelled to take active part in some outside activity." Edna Dunbar and William Kuykendall were the senior debaters, while Zepha Rogers and Ellis Meyers appeared for the juniors. Don C. Fisher, debate coach, presided.

Friday afternoon the sophomores and freshmen will debate on the subject, "Resolved, That final examinations in the high school be abolished."

City Manager Form Will Be Discussed

A school championship team will be taken from the teams. Christmas will mark the final debate.

"City Manager Form of Government" is the subject to be discussed at tomorrow's forum luncheon at the chamber of commerce. Considerable interest is being shown in debating of this subject. Inasmuch as it was one of the latest recommendations of the last city budget committee.

Galloway's orchestra will furnish entertainment for the luncheon.

Griffith to Hold Revival Meetings at Baptist Church

Announcement was made today by Rev. A. F. Simmons of the First Baptist church that a series of evangelistic meetings will be held at the church each evening this week, at 7:30. The services will be in charge of Rev. T. E. Griffith of Springfield, Ore. Rev.
