There is no lack of thrills and entertainment in Tod Browning's crook drama "The Unholy Three," showing tonight at the Pine Tree theater.

Indeed, it may be said that Browning has made more than a good underworld picture. He has made a melodrama that will go over anywhere with a bang because it contains real heart interest, plenty of comedy and a lot of drama.

The story is a most unusual one and deals with a trio of frenks—a giant, a midgot and a ventriloquist—who forsake their life in a dime museum to pursue a career of robbery and murder.
