Perry John, a muscular and broad shouldered Klamath Indian, went on trial this morning charged with a criminal assault upon an eight-year-old girl.

John is charged with having entered a home in Chiloquin one early morning and to have attempted assault upon a small child.

Marshal Chang Is In Retreat

TOKYO, Dec. 3. —(AP)—Chang Tso Lin's army is retreating from near Chincow, Manchuria, after a major battle. Tokyo vernacular newspapers stated today.

This is the first major engagement reported between Marshal Chang of Manchuria and his former subordinates, who recently revolted against him. Chincow is an important station on the Peking-Mukden railway, 229 miles northeast of Tientsin.

LOCAL STUDENT IS GIVEN HONOR

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, CORVALLIS, Ore., Dec. 3. —Edwin Fargo of Klamath Falls, freshman in engineering, made the second highest score in a recent Thurstone psychological examination with a mark of 221.

Psychological tests have been given in a few schools on this campus for several years in an experimental way, and the results of these trials are said to indicate a possibility of beneficial results from the wider and uniform application of this form of examination especially to entering students.

The Thurstone test is being used in a cooperative experiment by 109 participating colleges throughout the United States, O. A. C. being the only Oregon college to join in the trial. The examination is divided into eight parts including completion, arithmetic, artificial language, word analogies, figure analogies, number completion, absurdities and opposites.

Umatilla Rapids Project Receives Portland Support

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 3. (AP)—Portland's interest in the development of the Umatilla rapids project on the upper Columbia was demonstrated today at a conference of local business men held with Andrew Weiss, economics expert of the United States bureau of reclamation, under auspices of the reclamation committee of the chamber of commerce.

Weiss has been engaged in an economic survey of the project and came here by direction of Dr. Elwood Mead, commissioner of reclamation to confer with business men of Portland.

Portland business men pledged their hearty support to the project, saying that this city is vitally interested, not only from the standpoint of reclamation of many thousands of acres of land, but in the hydro-electric and the open river transportation features of the project.

W. L. Boise, chairman of the reclamation committee of the chamber, S. Marshall Dana, president of the Umatilla rapids association, stressed the point that while primarily the proposed development was to reclaim many thousand acres of arid land and make them productive, the canalization of the Columbia which will permit of water transportation from the interior tidewater and the development of a great amount of hydro-electric energy were things which had been given careful consideration in the final report on the project.

Former Publisher Klamath Visitor

Bruce Dennis, state senator from Willowa county and one of the most prominent figures in public life of Oregon, arrived in Klamath Falls last night to spend several days in the city attending to business matters.

Proposed Church Unity Defeated

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Dec. 3. —(AP)—Proposed unification of the Methodist Episcopal church, south, with the Methodist Episcopal church was defeated by 1949 votes of the required three-fourths majority in the southern church. Complete unofficial figures announced today by the secular press bureau of the southern church gave a total vote of 5543 with 4458 for and 4085 against.

The proposal received a majority of 273 votes.

Eight American Vessels Sent to Shanghai Waters

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3. —(AP)—The state department has not been told the reason for sending eight American naval vessels to Shanghai.

Advice from Minister John Van A. MacMurray at Peking have not indicated any particular threats against Americans or other foreign nationals in Shanghai or elsewhere in China, although it is well known that present international conditions in that country are disturbed.

It has been suggested that international naval vessels have been ordered into Chinese waters merely as a routine precautionary measure.

The only real disturbance in China which has resulted from the political upheaval which overthrew the Manchurian war lord, Chang Tso-Lin, was the riot a few days ago in Peking. The disturbance was directed against Chinese government officials, however, and not against foreigners. The Peking disturbances caused some concern here, however, because of the suspicion expressed in some quarters that they had been inspired and probably financed by Russian Soviet agents.
